**WAR NEWS.**

[By Telegraph to Reading Room and Daily Examiner.]

LONDON, Jan. 28.

On Saturday, after a violent bombardment, the Montenegrins captured three fortified islands in the Lake of Scutvrie. They are now preparing to attack the important fortress of Zabliak.

A despatch from Chals, Greece, says that the transport of troops, artillery and ammunition to the frontier is being vigorously pushed forward. All the infantry have left for Lorma amid great enthusiasm.

The "Standard's" special despatch from Constantinople says that the Sultan has received telegraphic information that the preliminaries of peace have been signed.

A division of the French Mediterranean Squadron left Toulon on Saturday for the Levant.

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.

The argument in the Supreme Court in Lafamme's case is strongly against the Minister. The general opinion is that he will be unseated. Dalton McCarthy's argument for the appellant was a brilliant one.

It is stated that Taschereau will resign from the Supreme Court, and Lafamme takes his place. He could not possibly be again elected in Jacques Cartier. Lafamme left in hot haste for Montreal to-night.

Two thousand workmen received the delegation at Montreal, that visited Ottawa to ask Premier Mackenzie and his Government to protect them.

The delegates returned with indignation in their breasts at the cool reception they received from Mr. Mackenzie.

The feeling among the working classes against the Government is intense. Sweeping resolutions were passed, strongly condemning the ruinous policy and general incompetence and corruption of the Government, and calling upon their fellow working men throughout the Dominion to vote solid against any candidate pledging himself to support Mackenzie's administration.

The Government officials say they are bound to elect Jones, of Halifax, at any cost.
