

Local and Other Items.

The labor trouble in Toronto still continues.

Seven hundred English emigrants arrived at Montreal on the 17th inst.

The usual full stock of fresh seeds has just arrived at Watson's Drug Store.

The Glee Club meets this evening at 8 o'clock, in Oddfellow's Hall, Prince Street.

A man named Lunar was scalded to death at the Londonery Iron Mines a few days ago.

JAMES ELLIS, of Macc's Bay, N. B., was drowned on the 17th inst. He was 17 years of age.

A ROW-BOT, containing two unknown men, was carried over Niagara Falls, on the 17th inst.

The "Northern Light" left Georgetown this morning, but has not yet reported at Pictou.

Jumbo has been installed in his new quarters at New York, and Mr. Barnum rejoices with great joy.

THE REV. FRANCIS PARTRIDGE, B. D., has inducted with the charges of St. Georges Parish, Halifax.

SEVERAL communications are unavoidably crowded out—among them the report of the Secretary of the Land League at Mill Cove.

THE mail arrived at Georgetown last evening, and were again delayed there for want of a special train. This will never do.

MR. JAMES P. TON, of W. A. Weeks & Co., has just returned from England, where he has been buying the spring stock for the firm.

SUGAR REFINING.—The Halifax sugar refinery, which has been closed for some time, resumed operations on the 18th inst., under its new management.

THE article of our regular correspondent "B," on "When was P. E. Island separated from the Mainland?" is republished in the Maritime papers.

REV. D. G. McDONALD has resigned the pastorate of the Baptist Church in this city. The resignation has been accepted, and takes effect on the 1st of July.

WILLIAM WALLACE McLEOD, Esquire, Assistant Post Office Inspector at Winnipeg, to be Post Office Inspector of Manitoba and the North West Territory.—Canada Gazette.

THE Patriot's charges against the Asylum are largely inaccurate. A statement of the facts will probably be published in the course of a day or two; and it will be shown that the management of the Hospital deserve credit rather than reprobation.

In a letter to the Patriot Mr. J. Hamilton, of New Perth, refers to the "able (though rather boastful) speeches of both the Leader and the Colonial Secretary. A Government which has saved \$127,000 of the peoples money in a single year, and turned a very large balance against the credit of the Province into a balance of \$12,000 in favor of the Province may well boast!

We see that the Plain Dealer, published in New Glasgow, N. S., has for its editor and manager our esteemed young friend and fellow-citizen, William D. Tanton, son of Mr. William Tanton of this city. The Plain Dealer is, as its name indicates, an uncompromising supporter of the present Dominion Government. The articles are well written and to the point. We wish our young friend every success which his energy and enterprise merits.—COMMUNICATED.

We learn that ex-Governor Laird was made the tool of the Opposition, to effect a large attendance at the meeting on Tuesday night. The satellites of the "party" made an active canvass among their friends—whether supporters of Government or Opposition—and extended to them a pressing invitation to attend the meeting—on personal grounds—as ex-Governor Laird was going to speak. The attraction, however, was not very great, and ex-Governor Laird's speech was rough on the Opposition's previous policy of drawing heavily from capital for transient improvements.

DONALD FARQUHARSON, Esq., at the Oppositionist meeting, on Tuesday night, stated that the West River district was "safe," as far as his re-election was concerned. Having, therefore, a little time to spare during the campaign, he will endeavor to assist his friends, whoever they are, in the Third District. It will be remembered that Mr. Farquharson was very confident of re-election, by an overwhelming majority in West River, in 1878. He then sneered at his opponent, Mr. Bain, and bragged that he would not receive two votes in his own settlement. The election returns proved that Mr. Farquharson had only twelve of a majority over Mr. Bain, and this, notwithstanding the immense influence of Mr. Farquharson, in the south side of the district. Looking at this fact, Mr. Farquharson's spare time will be precious during the present campaign.

THE Patriot complains that our reporter attended the Oppositionist meeting. Its editor was the only one there who objected to his presence. W. D. Stewart, Esq., in answer to these objections, stated that he would be glad to see the reporters of all papers present, as everything was done above board. Those in attendance coincided with Mr. Stewart, and immediately frowned down the efforts of Mr. Lawson to curb the Liberty of the Press, of which he is himself a member. The editor of the Patriot at this meeting made a rabid, rambling speech. Almost every statement he made contained a criminal accusation against the Government. Before concluding his tirade of abuse, however, Mr. Lawson addressed our reporter, —of whose presence at the meeting he so bitterly complains,—and asked if he would be kind enough to publish his speech in THE EXAMINER. This, our reporter declined to do because he knew the editor of the Patriot was out of temper at the "No Platform" cry, and knew not whereof he spoke. Again the Patriot charges our reporter with acting as a spy. The charge has no foundation in fact. Our reporter entered the meeting boldly, took a prominent seat, and his presence was known to all. He was kindly invited by the Chairman—Hon. Mr. Dodd—to address the meeting, but declined to make any lengthy remarks on the ground that the party had no "platform" or "policy" which could be discussed. Where, then, does the charge of spy apply? Our reporter proved himself to be more useful at the meeting than the editor of the Patriot. In yesterday's issue, he published a lengthy report of the proceedings which is substantially correct, and which, we learn, meets the approval of the Opposition party, whereas the Patriot has not a line in reference to the success of the meeting. We therefore fail to see any just reasons for the Patriot's complaint.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

New York, April 19

LONDON, April 19.

The Mansion House Jewish Committee last night empowered Mr. Nates, a leading merchant of Liverpool, to visit America, to assure the various committees there of the anxiety of the Mansion House Committee to work in accordance with them.

An order has been signed for the release from prison of Rourke, Mr. Egan's partner. Parnell has not left France, but will return to Kilmaham on Monday.

TORONTO, April 19.

This afternoon, at 3.30, a servant of A. Fisher, local manager of the Bank of Ontario, on entering the stable at the rear of the Bank building, was horrified to find the dead body of Mr. Fisher lying in a corner, a revolver clutched in his right hand and blood oozing from a wound in his mouth, into which one chamber had been discharged. Poor health seems to have been the only cause for the suicide. Deceased was 65 years of age, and highly respected. The Bank affairs are all right it is said.

LONDON, April 19.

A true bill for high treason was found against MacLean, the Queen's assailant, to-day. He pleaded not guilty, in a firm but low tone of voice. Montague Williams, opening for the prisoner, made insanity the ground of defence. He said MacLean had been confined in an asylum.
