

Dodgers Hit For Sandy As They Clobber Twins

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Sandy Koufax and Maury Wills took command of the World Series Monday as the first Los Angeles Dodgers humbled the free-ranging Minnesota Twins 7-0 and took a 3-2 edge by winning the fifth game.

Koufax allowed only four hits, struck out 10, and had a perfect game going until Harmon Killebrew got a single in the fifth on a ball that Willie Davis first misjudged and finally couldn't hold after a long run.

The Twins' second hit was an infield roller that Joe Nosssek just beat out by a whisker in the seventh. Frank Quilici and Sandy Valdespino singled in the ninth.

Wills tied a series record with four hits, including two doubles, in the Dodgers' total of 14 hits. After five games the Dodgers, were hitting .302 as compared to their regular season average of .245.

MOWED DOWN TWINS
Koufax, coming back with a strong effort after his defeat by Kaat in the second game last

Thursday, appeared on his way to a no-hitter or a perfect game as he mowed down the Twins in the early innings.

When Killebrew came up to open the fifth, Sandy had three out. He threw a curve that Killebrew miscalculated and he struck out. The Twins' muscular slugger lifted a fly ball to centre that Willie Davis appeared to lose in the sun momentarily.

When Wills finally started to run in the ball appeared to hit his glove and fall out.

The big crowd of 55,801 in the bright sunshine at Dodger Sta-

dium boomed when the official scorers' ruling was posted on the scoreboard in right field.

The Dodgers, who lost the first two games in Minnesota, were all over Kaat and his successors. They scored two in the first, two more in the third and never let up.

They now go back to Minnesota for a sixth game Wednesday afternoon and a seventh, if necessary, Thursday. There will be no game today, an open date for travel.

OPENED ATTACK
Wills opened the attack with a ground rule double that bounced into the stands in right in the first inning. Jim Gilliam, his old sidekick, singled him home.

Willie Davis' sacrifice bunt was taken by Killebrew, but Quilici, covering first, let the throw get through him and Gilliam came all the way home.

Davis kicked it off again in the third with a single to right. He stole second and sped home when Lou Johnson hit a single into centre field.

Ron Fairly promptly followed with a double to centre that scored Johnson, and the Dodgers were off and running with a 4-0 lead. Kaat gave way to Boswell after Fairly's double.

Wills was at it again in the fourth, beating out a slow roller to Zoilo Versalles for an infield single. After Boswell played cat-and-mouse with Wills, trying to keep him close with six straight pick off throws, Wills stole second on Boswell's first throw to Gilliam.

Gilliam promptly stroked a single to right centre, once again scoring Wills, the Dodgers' captain.

Ferry went to the mound for the Twins when the Dodgers picked up their last two runs in the seventh. Once again Wills was a factor, driving in the final

score with a single to centre that was his 10th of the series.

Fairly opened the seventh with a single and was moved along on Wes Parker's sacrifice.

ROSEBORO WALKED
After Dick Tracewski struck out, John Roseboro was walked intentionally.

Koufax, a strikeout victim the first three times, then drew a tremendous roar from the crowd by singling to centre, scoring Fairly. It was Sandy's first series' hit. Wills' single knocked in Roseboro, completing the scoring.

With 10 hits in 22 at bats, Wills has a good chance of setting a series record if it goes seven games. Bobby Richardson of the Yankees set the high of 13 hits last year.

Sam Mele, manager of the Twins, said he would not make a positive decision on his sixth game starter until after Tuesday's workout at Metropolitan Stadium.

He said he was considering Jim Merritt, Camilo Pascual and Jim (Mud Cat) Grant, but most observers believed he would fall back on Grant, his ace.

Grant pitched Sunday but was taken out after throwing to two batters in the sixth.

PRAISE KOUFAX
Mele called Koufax "great, absolutely great, the best I have ever seen." But he added, "we're not out of this thing yet. We're bounced back before. Our home park means a lot to us. We even scored on Koufax there."

Koufax had a no-hitter through four innings and a one-hitter through 6-1-3 innings until Nosssek just barely beat out a single on a ball hit in the hole to Wills' left. It was a bang-bang play at first.

Sandy appeared to tire—on coast—in the ninth. Quilici and pinch hitter Valdespino both singled. After striking out Versalles, he went to 3-0 on Nosssek before finally getting him to line into a game-ending double play.

Sandy struck out everybody in the starting line-up except Nosssek and Bettey. Tony Oliva, the American League batting champ, Bob Allison and Versalles each struck out twice.

OSTEEN NEXT
Claude Osteen, the statutor winner of the third game with a five-hit 4-0 victory, will work for the Dodgers in the sixth game.

Robinson Leads West

British Columbia flanker Peter Kempf moved into second place ahead of Calgary's Lovell Coleman in the Western Football Conference scoring race while his team was losing 14-12 to Edmonton Eskimos Saturday.

Kempf kicked two field goals to boost his total to 63, three points shy of top scorer Larry Robinson.

In the same game B.C. fullback Bob Swift consolidated his hold on sixth spot by scoring a touchdown, giving him a total of 48 points.

Edmonton end Tommy Joe Coffey, who had shared sixth place with Swift, dropped to seventh even though he kicked two converts. He now has 44 points.

Halfback Jim Thomas scored both Eskimo touchdowns and broke into the top ten scorers, vaulting into eighth place with 42 points.

rotation with Don Drysdale or fall back on Koufax.

In addition to his hitting and running, Wills started a spectacular double play in the eighth when he dug out Mincher's hard cap and tossed to Tracewski. He also was a factor in two other double plays during the game.

The Twins were so confused they even tried to pick Fairly out of their base after three were out in the third inning. Roseboro had struck out on the pitch for the third out, but Earl Bettey threw to Killebrew, who dove for Fairly. Umpire Tom Venzon was so surprised he even made a safe call.

The Dodger total of nine stolen bases could set a record if this series only goes six games. However, the seven-game record is out of reach. In 1959, the same year Wagner stole his three in one game.

BIG CROWD
It was another bumper crowd with big receipts of \$511,064.88, but the players took only an academic interest in the figures. They cut into only the first four games.

The winners probably will get about \$9,000 each and the losers close to \$7,000 when commissioner Ford Frick announces the cut in a few weeks.

"It certainly is nice to have seven runs and Sandy Koufax pitching," said Alston. "We're certainly not used to it."

"I hope to keep the club hot," said Alston, whose Dodgers will remain in Los Angeles for a workout today before flying to Minneapolis.

Alston said if Koufax had walked Versalles in the ninth, he would have gone out to talk to him. He said he had three men working in the bullpen.

Talking of the Dodgers' running game, Alston said, "Davis runs on his own. So do most of them until we put up the stop sign."

"It's tough to see the ball right off the bat," said Koufax. "I didn't feel I was going to pitch a no-hitter. I was surprised they didn't get more. Wills made a couple of good plays to help me."

"I was tired in the eighth, and if Walter wanted to bring in Ron Perranoski, it would have been all right with me."

Claud Osteen Wins Saturday

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Claude Osteen, bottom man of Los Angeles Dodgers' big-three pitchers, succeeded Saturday where Sandy Koufax and Don Drysdale failed and pitched his National League baseball team to a 4-0 World Series victory after the two aces had lost the first two games to Minnesota Twins.

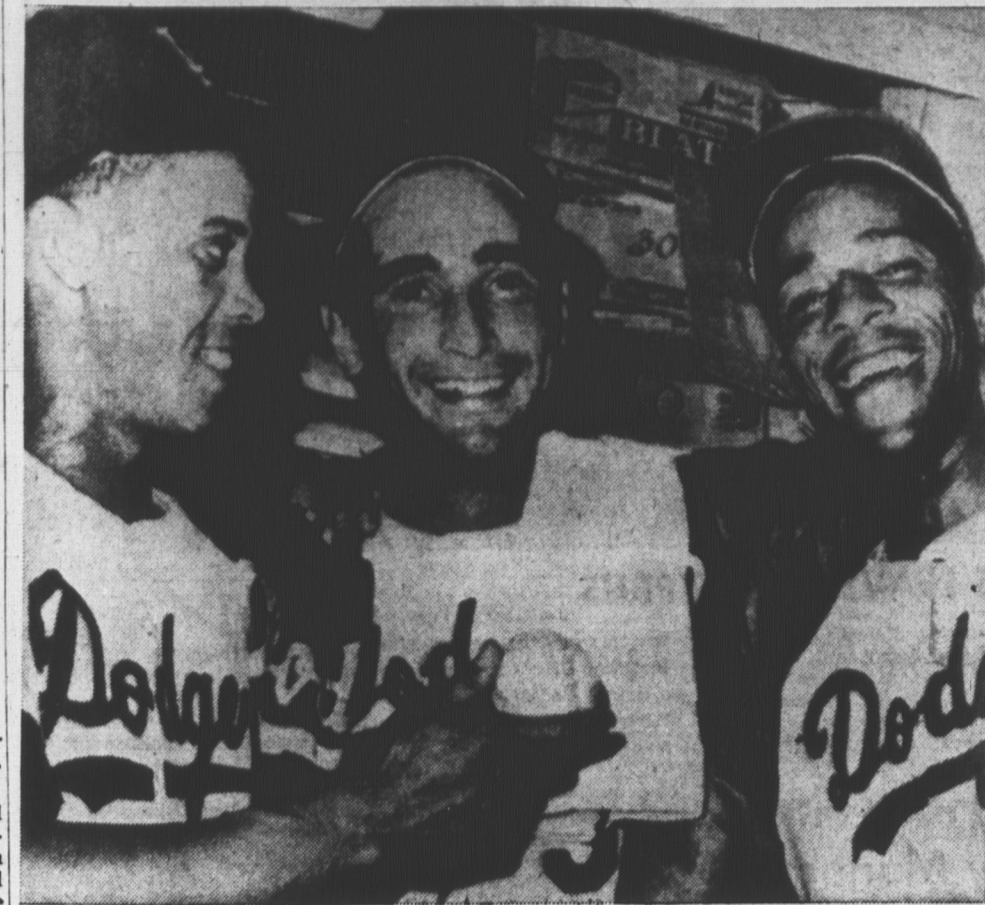
The former American League left-hander, who never lost to Twins in his days with Washington Senators, carried his charm through nine brilliant innings with a five-hitter to run his win-loss record against Minnesota to 6-0.

A Dodger Stadium record crowd of 55,934 saw Dodgers gang up on Camilo Pascual for two runs in the fourth on a bases-loaded single by John Roseboro. Lou Johnson's double, following Willie Davis' single, gave Los Angeles a third run in the fifth before Pascual faded for a futile pinch-hitter.

Jim Merritt gave up the final run in the sixth on a single by Wes Parker and a double by Maury Wills.

Twins lost more than the game when Earl Bettey, their No. 1 catcher, ran into the railing near Twins dugout while trying to catch a foul in the seventh. He was forced to leave the game.

DODGER CASUALTY
Los Angeles also had a casualty. Jim Lefebvre suffered a bruised right heel while scoring from second on Roseboro's hit in the fourth. X-rays proved negative, but Dick Tracewski took over.

Green Bay Gets Kicking

Vince Lombardi has no kicks coming now that Don Chandler's toe is back on target.

Kicking had become a source of constant irritation for Lombardi until Sunday when Chandler's toe and the threat of it turned into Green Bay Packers' most potent weapon.

The 10-year National Football League veteran boomed a 90-yard punt—the longest in modern professional football history—kicked two field goals and set up a touchdown with a daring 27-yard run from punt formation as the Packers beat San Francisco 40ers 27-10.

Don Drysdale Evens Series

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The re-charged Los Angeles Dodgers evaded the World Series at two games each Sunday, whipping Minnesota Twins 7-2 behind the five-hit pitching of Don Drysdale.

The Dodgers, who dropped the first two games, now will send their top ace, Sandy Koufax, against Jim Kaat in the fifth game today. Kaat beat Koufax in the second game.

Jim Madrox, Grant defeated Drysdale in the first game, but the Dodgers turned that around Sunday. They beat out key infield hits, rapped two home runs and took advantage of Minnesota fielding lapses, while Drysdale struck out 11 Twins and walked only two.

Ron Fairly drove in three runs for the Dodgers, the last two in the sixth inning when they erupted for three runs and knocked starter Grant out of the game.
