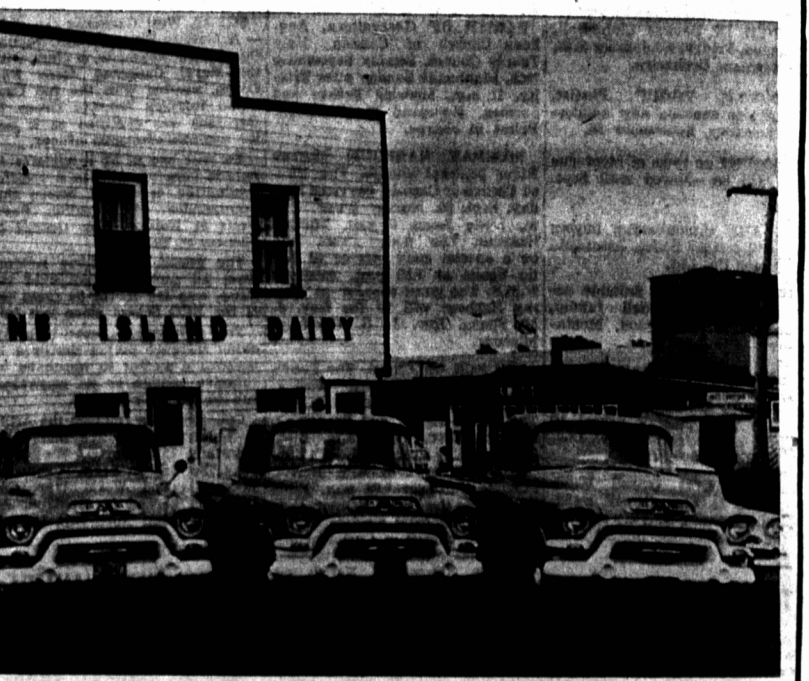

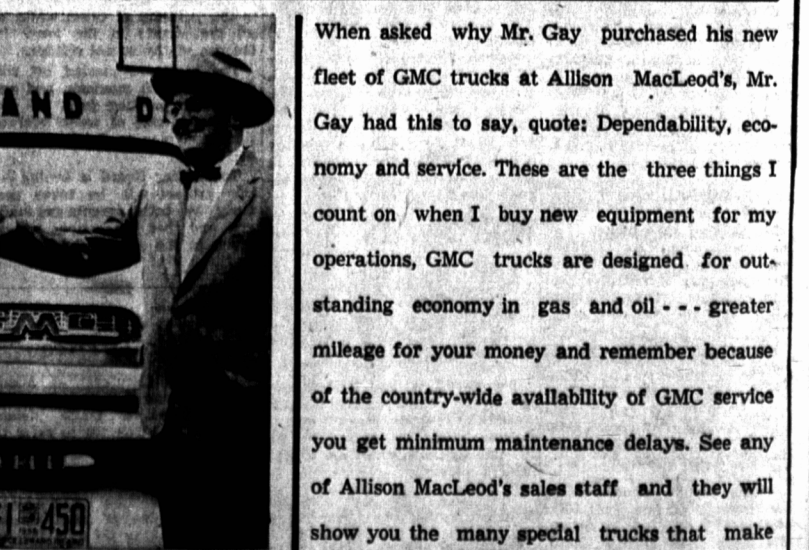

Middleweight Robinson And Fullmer Title Bout Dec. 12

NEW YORK (AP) — After four months of intermittent negotiations, middleweight champion Ray Robinson signed Thursday to defend his crown against Gene Fullmer, leading contender from West Jordan, Utah, at Madison Square Garden here Dec. 12.
The 15-rounder will be broadcast and telecast.
Asked how soon the heavyweight title fight would be made between light-heavyweight champion Archie Moore and Floyd Patterson, promoter Jim Norris said: "I hope shortly. We're agreed on most everything but the site. Moore wants Los Angeles and Patterson wants New York. I prefer Chicago."
The protracted bargaining for the middleweight match paid off for the 36-year-old Robinson. Sugar Ray will get 47½ per cent of the net gate and the fighters' 60 per cent share of the \$100,000 radio-TV package.
ANXIOUS TO FIGHT
Thus Robinson's purse will amount to about \$140,000 if Norris' prediction of a "sellout, \$200,000" gate comes true. Fullmer, 25, will get about \$20,000 on his 12½ per cent of the gate. If Fullmer wins, he has to give Ray a return bout within 90 days with each getting 30 per cent.
