NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

LONDON, July 9.
 The "Daily News" regrets Lord Lansdowne's resignation, although it believes he acted under a mistaken apprehension of the character and scope of Mr. Forster's measure.
 The "Telegraph" says the Marquis of Lansdowne is much pressed by his colleagues to remain in the Ministry.
 The "Post" says it is no secret that some of the most important members of the Cabinet share the views of the Marquis of Lansdowne, and there are others, though not holding high offices, who have been striving, and are still seeking, to induce the Government to withdraw from the obnoxious position they have taken.
 The Irish Government sent a physician to County Mayo to inquire into the nature and extent of famine fever there and in neighboring Counties, which is reported spreading alarmingly.
 At a meeting of Irish members the greatest dissatisfaction and disappointment was expressed regarding the conduct of the Government in connection with the compensation bill.
 The News says the delay in bringing forward the Indian financial statement will attract remark. The impression is that some large reform is contemplated by the Government relating to the liabilities of India.

LONDON, July 9.
 The following telegram, dated Peking, July 2, was received yesterday: "Chung How, the Chinese Ambassador to Russia, who negotiated the Kulja treaty, has been relieved, to show that China does not wish to hurt Russia's dignity, and desires the continuance of friendly relations."
 PARIS, July 9.
 It is thought the amnesty bill will now pass the Senate by a small majority. The Dominicans have received an intimation that their establishment will be broken up on Saturday.
 PERA, July 9.
 Favorable assurances have been given by the Porte to Montenegro.
 Prince Niketa has ordered his representative to remain at Pera.
 VIENNA, July 9.
 Latest intelligence from Serajevo states that the excitement caused by the attempted murder of Hassan Pasha has abated. When Hassan Pasha ordered a general disarmament Eynob Bey, one of the most fanatical Mussulmans, with several followers went to him and protested against the measure. Hassan Pasha replied by striking Eynob Bey with a stick. The followers of the latter threw themselves upon Hassan, and he was taken to Metrovizza mortally wounded.

PARIS, July 9.
 The committee of the Senate has adopted the Amnesty Bill proposed by Gen. Pelesier, excluding incendiaries and assassins as those who had been condemned after due trial from the benefits of the bill.
 ST. PETERSBURG, July 9.
 Intelligence has been received that the explorer Col. Prjevalsky and party are prisoners in the hands of the Chinese. A Russian caravan has been pillaged on the frontier and two merchants killed.
 Advice from Orenburg report that a Russian officer had arrived there to hire 500 camels for General Skoboloff's expedition.
 LONDON, July 9.
 A Vienna despatch reports that Greek officers on leave of absence, and now in Russia, have been recalled.
 A St. Petersburg despatch has the following:—"At a banquet at the Chinese Embassy, representatives of all foreign Powers except Russia were present."
 DANVILLE, Va., July 12.
 Thomas DeJarnette, a young man, shot his sister last night, and gave himself up to the police, saying he done it to remove disgrace to the family. The girl is not dead, and begged the officers not to punish her brother, as he did right. She cannot live. They are of good family.

NEW YORK, July 9.
 Counsel for Chastine Cox has applied to the Governor for the commutation of his sentence to imprisonment for life. The Governor is absent and no reply will be had before Monday. The day of execution is the 16th.
