HE TALKED WITH HIS MOUTH

And Had to Apologize.

Chapleau's Reply to Lister.

OTTAWA, Aug. 14. In the Public Accounts Committee, Hyman, member for London, was charged with having said outside the House, as reported by the Toronto Globe, that the Government was trying to burk the enquiry, and that the chairman of the committee acted in a partisan manner. An hour and a half was spent in a wrangle, but Hyman was finally compelled to withdraw his statement and apologize. The rest of the morning was occupied by Lister trying to prove corruption, that an agreement had been entered into by Chapleau with the New England Paper Company, and that part of the profits on paper sold the printing bureau should be applied to the reduction of the amount due the Company by LaPresse, of Montreal, in which Chapleau is a shareholder. Chapleau challenged Lister or any one else to make the charge in the House, which was the proper way, and not in the public accounts committee. Before the discussion on this subject was finished the committee adjourned.

THE TARTE-McGREEVEY CASE

Sir Hector's Examination Over.

His Character Vindicated.

OTTAWA, Aug. 14. In the Tarte-McGreevey case yesterday, Tarte explained his reasons for not charging Langevin with corruptly receiving money. The cross-examination of Sir Hector has been concluded, and resulted in a triumphant vindication of his public and private character. This is generally acknowledged. After Sir Hector's examination was over he was warmly congratulated by members and friends, including several Grit members. Mulock wished Perley recalled. Chairman Girouard said he had a doctor's certificate that it would be fatal to examine Perley again, and if the committee insisted they must find another chairman. Mulock withdrew his motion. Col. Amyot is to be reported to the House for examining the books of Lykin, Connolly & Co., which he had no right to do, with the view of gaining information to be used in a law suit pending. Tarte admitted yesterday that Murphy had deceived him regarding money which he stated he had paid Langevin, and said that Murphy's sworn evidence differed vastly from the information Murphy gave him before the investigation commenced.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Against Gifts and Testimonials.

Laurier Gets Dressed Down.

OTTAWA, Aug. 14. In the House of Commons yesterday, Cartwright proposed a resolution deprecating the acceptance by the Ministers of gifts or testimonials from contractors, government officials or persons having peculiar relations with the government. Sir John Thompson very much surprised the Opposition by accepting the broad principle of the resolution, and it was carried after a short but sharp debate. In the course of the discussion Chapleau gave Laurier a dressing such as he never received before in the House or out of it, and which he will probably not forget quickly. He accused Laurier of deliberate misrepresentation and misquotation of a pamphlet which had been published during the Biel excitement, and accused Laurier of inciting a drunken mob in Montreal to drag him (Chapleau) from the platform while they were burning his effigy before his face. There was breathless excitement during Chapleau's speech, which was received with prolonged cheering. Ex-Speaker Oulmet also denounced Laurier's conduct as unworthy the leader of a great party.

BAY CHALEUR INVESTIGATION

Pacaud Has Skipped Out, AND CARNEAU WON'T ATTEND

OTTAWA, Aug. 14. In the Senate Railway Committee yesterday, Inspector O'Leary testified to his inability to find Pacaud in Quebec, but discovered that about the time on Tuesday that he visited Pacaud's office, Pacaud left Quebec for New York. Two bank cashiers were the only witnesses who appeared in answer to the Committee's summonses. One of them proved a connection between Pacaud's bank account and the letter of credit issued by the Quebec Government on railway accounts. But Pacaud had sent to the bank and obtained all his checks before he left for Europe. Hon. P. Carneau replied to the committee that he had consulted Mercier and the rest of his colleagues and had decided to take no notice of the committee's summonses. Armstrong was again recalled. He refused to answer questions and he will be reported to the Senate. The excitement over the Bay Chaleur scandal increases hourly. The Grits are in a bad hole, and are painfully aware of it.

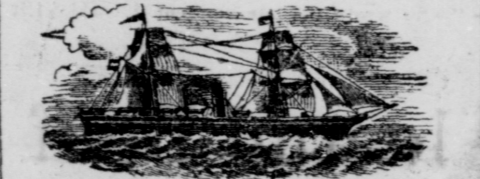
