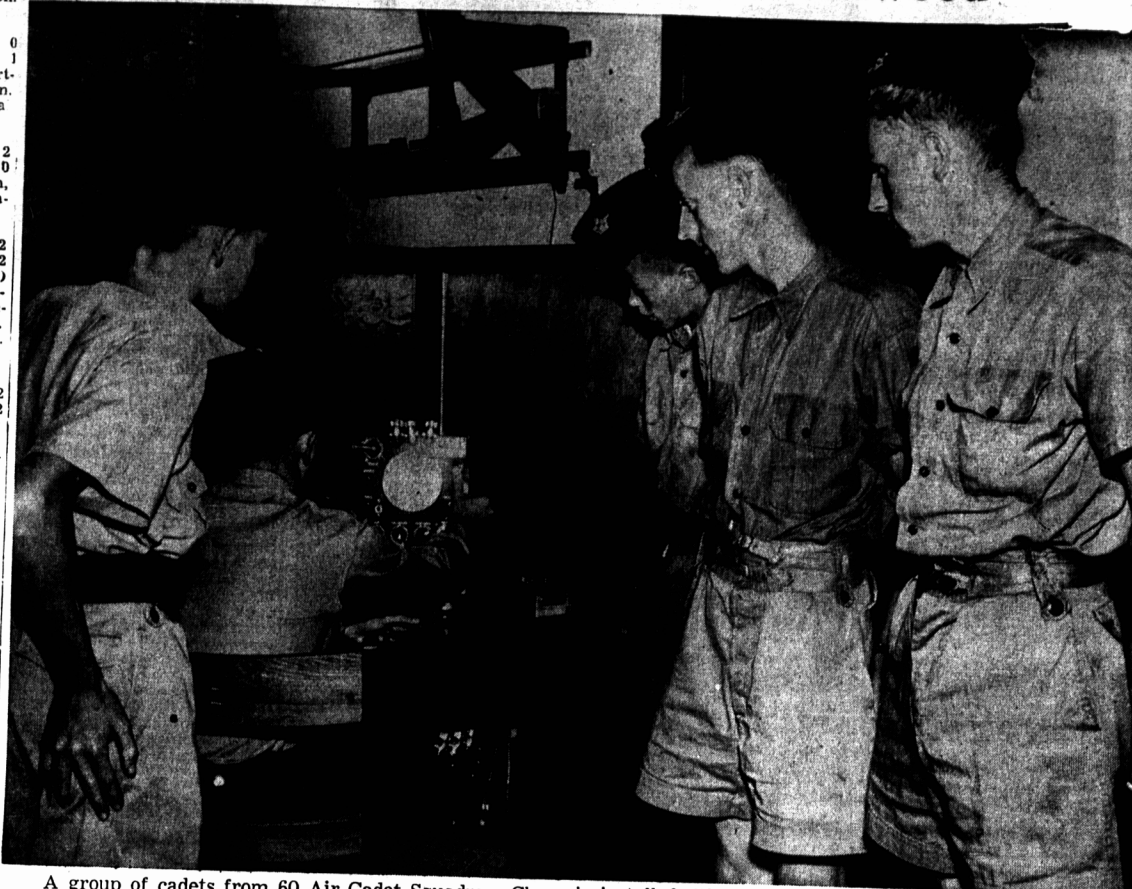

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SAIGON (AP)—The French high command reported Friday night calm has returned to the Red river delta after the sporadic military action which followed the July 27 cease-fire. Localized fighting continues in some other sectors of Viet Nam, largest of the three Indo-China states and the one which has borne the brunt of the war.

WHITBY, Ont. (CP)—Some 17 youth leaders of the United Church of Canada will meet at the Ontario Ladies College here Aug. 11 for the seventh Young People's National Council. A new national executive will be elected and program of work will be mapped for the next two years. The meetings will last five days.

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian railroads carried 10,443,316 tons of revenue freight last April, the bureau of statistics reported Friday. The total was 15.2 per cent less than in the corresponding month last year when 12,305,853 tons were carried. Loadings in Canada dropped to 7,779,049 tons from 9,301,543 tons.
