

Kings Postal Service To Remain On Schedule

District director of postal services, J. G. Cunningham, Saint John, N.B. announced yesterday that the Post Office department will continue the daily highway service on the three routes out of Charlottetown to the eastern part of the province in view of the decision of the Canadian National Railways to discontinue its daily winter service.

In other years, the summer highway postal service came to a halt during the winter, when the CNR resumed its daily winter service. However, this year the CNR has discontinued service to Kings County points.

The postal department will continue on the same schedule "until such time as changes are deemed necessary".

The winter service out of Charlottetown to the three eastern points, Souris East, Georgetown and Murray Harbor, will start Monday and continue until approximately May 15.

Contractor's for the winter service are Donald Crook et al, Charlottetown; James B. Johnston, Souris East; and Alfred A. Mullen, Charlottetown.

On the Charlottetown to Murray Harbor run Mr. Crook leaves Charlottetown at 3:20 p.m. due to arrive at the destination at 5:25.

Along the way he will stop at Murray River (5:40); Bellefleur (6:30); Newton Cross (3:57); Belfast (4:06); Iona (4:41); Ocean View (4:22); Beaton's Mills (4:33); Bellefleur (4:41); Wood Islands North (4:50); Hopefield (5:02); Murray River (5:11); and Murray Harbor.

Returning he will stop only at Murray River (5:40); Bellefleur (6:05); Belfast (6:20); Vernon Bridge (6:38) and Charlottetown (7:00).

On the Charlottetown to Souris East route Mr. Mullen leaves Charlottetown at 3:30 arriving at Souris East at 5:20.

On the Charlottetown to Georgetown route Mr. Mullen leaves Charlottetown at 3:30 arriving at Little York (3:45); Bedford Station (3:55); Tracadie Cross (4:05); Mount St. Charles (4:17); Bristol (4:32); Morell (4:35); Mideville (4:41); St. Peter's Bay (4:47); Armadale (5:02); Bear River (5:10); and Souris East.

Returning he will stop only at St. Peter's Bay (5:50); Morell (6:55); Mount Stewart (6:20); and Charlottetown (7:00).

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Nfld. Epidemic Is Diminishing

ST. JOHN, Nfld. (CP) — Deputy Health Minister T. A. Knowling said Wednesday the gastro-enteric epidemic in the province is diminishing and cases are less severe.

Dr. Knowling said the department has recorded no deaths since Oct. 7. There are still 20 cases being treated at the fever hospital here.

The disease, caused mainly by an unclear avirulent strain, claimed 79 lives in 1963 and infected more than 1,000 others.

Two Service Stations Report Breaks, Thefts At Geo'town

GEORGETOWN — Police in this town are currently conducting investigations into two service station breaks which are reported to have taken place during the early hours of Wednesday morning.

The first break is said to have occurred at McConnell's B-A station at the corner of Kent and Grafton streets, Georgetown, where entry into the building was made by breaking the glass in the front door, and reaching through to open the night-latch from the inside.

The intruders also broke a large window adjacent to the door and another at the rear of the building.

On checking the stock, the proprietor, Charles A. McConell, reported that the culprits had taken \$5 in loose pennies and \$4 to \$5 in toilet paper.
