Budget Approved At Meeting Of Provincial Red Cross Executive

Campaign returns to date for 1954 were reported \$44,300, and a report presented by the Chairman, Mrs. E. A. Foster, told that 8 of the 12 cases of finished supplies containing 4,212 articles made up by the women of the province, and valued at \$2,446.56 — the actual cost of the materials at factory prices — were recently shipped to the League of Red Cross Societies at Geneva, to replace some of the clothing recently flown to Pakistan after the floods there. The other four cases will be sent forward as soon as shipping instructions are received. The workrooms have now re-opened and the cutting and assembling of materials for the winter's work is going forward.

Miss Katherine MacLennan, chairman of the Nursing Committee, said that the Home Nursing Classes are presently underway, and that 3 more will start in the near future. She stated that the amount of sickroom equipment borrowed from the Loan Boards in the province will reach an all-time high this year, and that at the present time every wheel-chair and gatch bed is out on loan.

Dr. George Fisher who has acted as Chairman of the Swimming and Water Safety Committee during the past summer in the absence of Rev. M. D. Dunbar, reported that 70 courses were conducted during the summer with a total enrolment of 3,361. A complete summary of these classes were distributed to those present and plans were made to resume additional community assistance with these classes.

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Addressed Group On Social Credit

Mr. Orvis A. Kennedy, national organizer of the Social Credit party, addressed a small group in the Clover Club last evening, in which he traced the history of the party in Alberta and British Columbia stressing the reduction in the net debt of each under Social Credit Government.

Quoting the figures for British Columbia, Mr. Kennedy indicated a reduction of more than fifty million dollars from February 1952 until the first of August of this year.

He also described in detail the removal of consumer taxes including the reduction of registration fees on passenger and commercial vehicles by 90 per cent from ten dollars to one dollar.

In public works, he said that the cost of road construction varied widely between plateaus and mountain country ranging from \$60,000 to \$300,000 per mile but the highway program now being carried out was the largest in the history of the province.

Mr. Kennedy then described Social Credit, dwelling briefly on inflation, deflation, monopoly, economic security and the social system of democracy which enables the people to get the results they want by freely co-operating together. He concluded with a description of the Social Credit monetary proposals.

Mr. Kennedy, who is a former member of Parliament from British Columbia, was introduced by Peer V. Paynter, vice president of the Social Credit Association of Canada. They attended a Provincial Convention in Fredericton on Saturday and leave today for New Glasgow, N.S., where a meeting will be held tonight.

Former Islander Dies Suddenly In Malden

A former Charlottetonian, Mr. Arthur L. Stanley, who had lived for the past half century in Malden, Mass., died recently, the victim of a heart attack.

Mr. Stanley was driving with his daughter, Mrs. Hazel C. Crowe of Reading, Mass., seconds before being stricken. Mrs. Crowe went into a store on business and upon returning found her father had been taken ill. She summoned a doctor but Mr. Stanley died on the ride to the doctor's office.

The deceased was born in Charlottetown, the son of the late Thomas K. and Selena (Dawes) Stanley of Surrey, England. He was a conductor on the Boston and Maine railroad for more than 50 years and had retired only two years ago.

In addition to Mrs. Crowe he is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Janet Rittall and Mrs. Joyce Wilmot, also a brother Harry Stanley of Mauchunk, Pa. and a sister Mrs. Bess Sterns of Edmonton, Alberta.
