Riots Threaten, Indian Warns

TORONTO (CP)—An Indian from Winnipeg has warned that Los Angeles-style riots are possible today wherever Indians feel the white man's brand of injustice.

Fred Favel, a Cree, said Indians have been "murdered" in Canada in a style reminiscent of the slayings of Negroes in the southern United States. He was speaking at an Iroquois conference attended by representatives of 40,000 Iroquois in North America.

Mr. Favel cited several instances of what he called injustice and violence—in British Columbia, Ontario and Manitoba. "Some day your Kenoras, Sault Ste. Maries and North Battlefords are going to be your

Los Angeles," Mr. Favel warned. "And you had better believe it."

CONDEMNED ACT—Another Indian, Andrew Maracle of the Decoronto Reserve near Branford, condemned the Indian Act as an infamous piece of legislation which had turned reservation life into a one-way street.

Under the act, Indians are not allowed to purchase land adjacent to their reservations for expansion purposes but the federal government can expropriate their lands, he said.

"If you legislate for us then at least allow us to examine and question the legislation. The St. Lawrence Seaway was built through Iroquois reserves and they had not been able to obtain compensation from the government," he added.

FEAR TRANSFER—Chief James Monture of the Caughnawaga Reserve near Montreal said Quebec Mohawks feared the federal government would give jurisdiction of Indians to Quebec.

Matthew Etienne of Oka, a Quebec reserve, said the Mohawks of Quebec were English-speaking. "We have never learned to speak French and we are never going to."

"We are more and more faced with the fear that our lives may be controlled by a language that is foreign to us. We don't intend to speak three languages and we will resist their being forced on us."

Quebec's intense nationalism made it very hard, he added, for the voice of a small group of Iroquois to be heard across Canada.

Nobel Award Is Criticized

STOCKHOLM (Reuters)—The Swedish press has criticized the award of this year's Nobel Prize for literature to Russian author Mikhail Sholokhov but they generally agreed he was a writer of Nobel Prize class.

The trade union newspaper Stockholm-Tidningen asks: "What has Sholokhov written of Nobel class during the last 25 years. Not even the 16 men who formulated the academy's official reason for the choice can answer that one."

The mass circulation newspaper Expressen says it was "an ironical situation for an academy which so long has found Pablo Neruda (the Chilean poet) far too political to receive the prize."

"With the 25th anniversary of And Quiet Flows the Don the academy has crowned its post-humous works. Are you still living Sholokhov? Come then and receive your prize."

The conservative Svenska Dagbladet and Liberal Dagens Nyheter says no one could deny Sholokhov was a worthy winner and were in favor of the award.

DENOUNCES RUSSIA—PHNOM PENH (AP)—An angry Prince Sihanouk returned Sunday to Cambodia and denounced the Soviet Union for withdrawing an invitation for him to visit Moscow in November. Sihanouk visited China, North Korea and Burma.

First Families Moving Into 200-Unit Housing Project

WINNIPEG (CP)—The Prairie tradition of the co-operative has taken up residence in Winnipeg's Willow Park. Twenty-three families already have moved into the 200-unit co-operative housing project which by completion will have cost \$2,500,000.

One Willow Park resident, S. E. Varcoe, says, "we wanted to be part of a pioneer project. A householder automatically becomes a part-owner of the project when he makes a down payment which ranges from \$566 for a one-bedroom home to \$600 for four bedrooms."

Monthly payments—from \$91 to \$137—cover 30-year mortgage payments, carrying charges, taxes, insurance, heat, power, water, maintenance and administration. Only the telephone is extra.

Utilities cost less than they normally do because the co-operative buys them in bulk. The idea was imported from Sweden where more than 20 per cent of all housing is in the co-op category.

Construction began just over a year ago on a 15-acre site about five miles from downtown Winnipeg. Exterior work on all units will be completed this autumn.

S. J. Borgford, president of the Co-operative Housing Association of Manitoba, said the project's purpose is "to provide public housing at cost of the people."

"People should own and control the housing they live in," he said.

Mr. Borgford said when the idea was first proposed in 1960, it was defeated because of fear that the plan would kill public housing. "It was a question of education," he said.
