plete with car wash, grease pit, and hydraulic lift.
In addition to the maintenance section the building contains a modern show room, parts department, office, and two rest rooms. The building is oil heated throughout. The office and show room floors are covered with a pattern style of green and cream tile.
The walls of this section of the building are finished in varnished Brazil pine plywood to a height of four feet, and the balance of the walls and the ceiling are finished in a light green wall board. In addition to electric lighting facilities, three large picture windows overlooking the highway provide an excellent view of the showroom to passing motorists, as well as providing excellent natural lighting within this section of the station. The large area of window space in the service section of the building also provides an unusual amount of natural light for the interior of this section of the building.
Building construction was begun on April 20th and completed on July 20th under the supervision of Mr. Charlie Adams of Charlottetown.
