

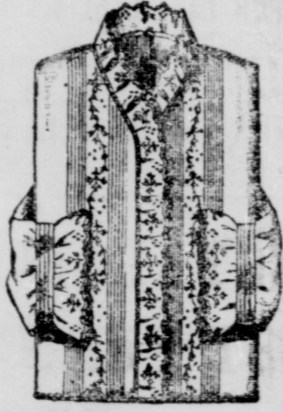
Local and Other Items.

THE MARKETS.—Trade at the market today was usual, of the first part of the forenoon, the outside attendance being, however, much larger than inside. Eggs sold well at 17 to 19 cents per dozen. Butter (fresh) was very scarce and was quickly bought up at 22 to 24 cents per lb., while tub lots brought 18 to 20 cents per lb. Fuel were scarce at 55 to 65 cents per pair. Geese brought 70 to 80 cents per pair and turkeys 90 to \$1.25 each. Hay was in extra good supply and sold well at 50 to 60 cents per 100 lbs. and straw about \$1.75 per lump load. Oats were moving very slowly at about 32 to 33 cents per bushel. SKATING.—The Rink last night presented quite an odd time sight, the attendance being much larger than on any previous occasion during this season. The ice was good and even. Mr. Galbraith and his bandmen seemed to take fresh courage as the music was better than usual and more of it. If the Skating Rink is to be continued as one of our chief winter amusements it will be necessary for the need of good health giving and enjoyable exercise, to rally around the Rink and set apart Monday and Thursday evening of each week for the balance of this short season as it has not so far paid expenses. 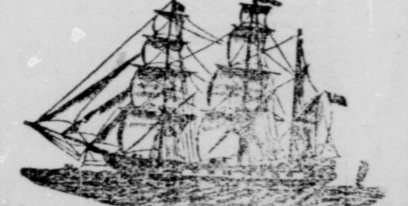
