

PROVINCIAL FLOWER COMMITTEE MAKING PLANS FOR ANNUAL SHOW

The recently formed provincial flower show committee with Dr. Henry Myose of Summerside as president and a committee from the local Abegweit Chapter I.O.D.E. under the convener-ship of Mrs. Leslie Simmons, have been busy making plans for the third annual flower show to be held in the Baptist Church hall, Summerside on Tuesday Aug. 31st and Wednesday Sept. 1st.

The special feature to be judged by popular vote is a white basket with flowers featuring the colors of the Prince Edward Island coat of arms, red, yellow, green, and white for which the I.O.D.E. is offering a first prize donated by Mrs. Arthur Allen and second prize by Mrs. Wanda Wyatt. Besides the above there are two trophies to be competed for annually: the Maurice Mill silver rose bowl for the greatest number of points in the show, and the R. T. Holman silver tray for the best individual table decoration: also prizes given by the Robert L. Cotton Memorial Nursery, Charlottetown.

This year's show will again be sponsored by the Abegweit Chapter and they're looking forward to a much larger and more beautiful display than ever, for they hope that entries from many new exhibitors may be added to those of previous years.

The Island is famous for the freshness and vivid coloring of its grass and flowers and with the interest and cooperation of the growers this year should be one of the finest displays in Canada. Entry lists have been sent out to all former exhibitors and also may be obtained at Enmans Drug Store or from the convener, Mrs. Leslie Simmons.

There is a place for almost everyone who grows or loves flowers to make some entry since the list is so varied, including this year a section for potted plants as well as a childrens corner.

Suffers Injuries While Working At Alberton

—Mr. Jack McAlduff, Alberton, is a patient in the Western Hospital, Alberton, suffering multiple injuries and a fractured shoulder blade caused when he was buried in a cave-in at the new R.C.M.P. detachment building.

The accident occurred about ten o'clock yesterday morning when Mr. McAlduff in company with Arthur Ramsey and Melvin Albert, both of Alberton, was working in a nine foot deep trench near the new building. A heavy clay loading machine working nearby apparently caused the sides of the trench to cave in burying the accident victim. Fortunately Mr. McAlduff, who was engaged in placing loose clay beneath pipes in the trench, was standing upright at the time of the slide in otherwise he would have been completely buried and it is doubted if he could have been rescued in time. Approximately twenty minutes elapsed before he was fully dug out and removed from the trench. Following treatment by Dr. Bandler, who was on the scene during digging operations, he was rushed to the hospital where he was said to be resting comfortably last evening.

Portugal Orders Out Diplomats

By EUGENE LEVIN NEW DELHI (AP) — Portugal handed orders Friday to Indian diplomats stationed in her colonial territories on the West Indian coast. India promptly retaliated by ordering the Portuguese consul-general and consul to quit Bombay by Sunday.

Portugal charged that Indian consuls-general Vincent Coelho at Goa, the capital of Portuguese India, and his deputy at Mormugao have led an underground movement seeking merger with India. They were given until today at noon to leave.

Tension between India and Portugal over the 1,537 square miles of Portuguese holdings on the Indian sub-continent has been high since Indian nationalists seized the Portuguese village of Dadra a week ago. Reports received in Bombay Thursday said Indians had taken control of six nearby villages in the Portuguese district of Daman, 100 miles north of Bombay.
