## Defection of M.P. Brings New Crisis To Konrad Adenauer in West Germany

BONN (AP)—A member of the Adenauer regime's top-secret parliamentary committee on European security has fled to Communist East Germany and West German officials said Tuesday night he could have done so "only with the intention of treason."

The defection of Karl Franz Schmidt - Wittmack, member of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's own Christian Democratic party on the highly sensitive committee, posed a grave new crisis for the Adenauer regime. It came only a month after the desertion to the East of Dr. Otto John, West German security chief.

## Flays Security Regulations For Duchess' Visit

LONDON (Reuters)—The outspoken Daily Mirror today flayed Canadian authorities for making a "barricade" of the visit of the Duchess of Kent and Princess Alexandra by imposing strict "Victorian" security regulations.

In a front-page editorial topped by a splash headline, "Why wrap the gay princess in cotton wool?" it particularly dealt with how the regulations will spoil 17-year-old Alexandra's fun.

It said that the princess should be walking straight into the hearts of Canadians—people like herself "ready with a smile and a handshake." Instead, "She will find that she has walked into a cocoon of clammy, official humbug."

## ELECTORS IN 3 PROVINCES TO PASS JUDGMENT

# By-elections In 6 Ridings

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadians in three provinces will have an opportunity this fall to pass judgment on major political issues which have arisen in the last week.

The government's position on each issue may be assessed by the public at three federal by-elections in Ontario, two in Quebec and one in Manitoba. The House of Commons vacancies were caused by the death of three members and the resignations of three cabinet ministers July 1.

Progressive Conservative party already has indicated the position his party's candidates will take in the by-elections.

George Hees, national president of the Progressive Conservative Association, said in a speech in Montreal that Canada has "missed the boat" in building the seaway. He said "lack of initiative and courage on the part of the federal government and its lack of confidence in Canada's ability to build a major part of the St. Lawrence seaway is to be built by the United States."

- BOYS TOWN, Neb. (CP)—A world's altitude record has been set by a United States Air Force test plane, it was announced Saturday night. While the exact altitude reached was not disclosed, it was understood to be considerably higher than the previous record of 83,235 feet, set in August by Douglas Skyrocket D558-2. Identity of the plane, pilot, time or place was not disclosed.
- BALMOREN, Scotland (AP)—The Queen, suffering from a cold, stayed indoors Sunday as a precaution against the bleak weather in the Scottish highlands where she is vacationing with her children. She did not attend the usual Sunday service at Crathie church.
- REGINA (CP)—Leaders of close to 1,000 members of Canada's two biggest rival labor congresses have agreed on a treaty barring raids on each other's membership, it was learned Sunday.
- CHATHAM, N. B. (CP)—Fisheries Minister Sinclair has advised G. Roy McWilliam, M.P. for Northumberland, that a request by fishermen in Northumberland and Gloucester counties for extension to 80 days of the lobster season just concluded cannot be granted.
- ZIEGENHAIN Germany (AP)—Two thousand former Nazi party members Sunday called on the West German and state governments to annul all denazification court convictions and pay damages to Nazis interred after the Second World War.
- MILLTOWN, N. B. (CP)—Fifteen employees were released Saturday, the vanguard of 350 to be let out within months as Textile Sales Ltd. stops production here. HALIFAX (CP)—The weather office says a high pressure area covering Quebec and New England is moving slowly eastward and will cause fine weather over the Maritimes today.

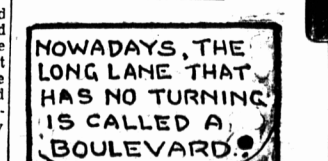
