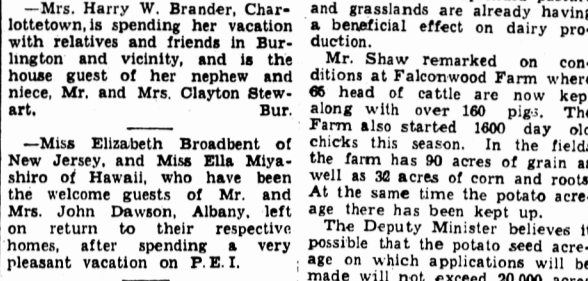
BAND CONCERT TONIGHT

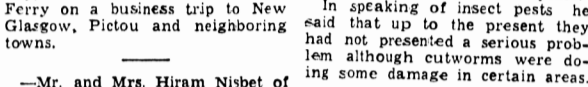
Comments On Low Potato Acreage
The possibility that the potato acreage in the Province this year may be too low was voiced by Mr. Walter R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, in commenting on the general crop situation. He states that it possibly will be the lowest for many years. He says that growing conditions are excellent everywhere on the island with root crops developing tremendous growth and early grains showing unusual color and vigor. A heavy hay crop is also assured and with splendid pasture and grasslands are already having a beneficial effect on dairy production. Mr. Shaw remarked on conditions at Falconwood Farm where 66 head of cattle are now kept along with over 160 pigs. The farm also started 1800 day old chicks this season. In the fields the farm has 90 acres of grain as well as 32 acres of corn and roots. At the same time the potato acreage there has been kept up. The Deputy Minister believes it possible that the potato seed acreage on which applications will be made will not exceed 20,000 acres this year and that the conclusion of field inspection may find little more than half the acreage passed in the last one or two years. In speaking of insect pests he said that up to the present they had not presented a serious problem although cutworms were doing some damage in certain areas.

Decorated For Bravery In Korea

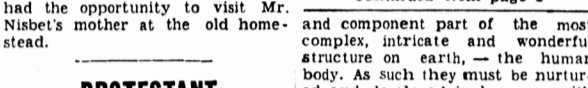

President's Report
"Today it is my privilege and pleasure to welcome you to this 32nd annual meeting of the Provincial Auxiliary of the Orphanage. "As the past year has been the most successful in the history of the Orphanage, it is gratifying to have a large attendance. On this June day, with the building and grounds very lovely, the children exceptionally healthy and happy, we must realize that down through the years we have not laboured in vain.

Our Auxiliary has completed another highly successful year, May I emphasize that this success was achieved only through the combined efforts of all the members who gave so freely of their time and their ability. "To the Trustees the Auxiliary paid \$11,412.00, while boxes of valuable clothing, toys and treats of all kinds were forwarded to the children. "Our time is limited today, but I wish to tell you something of the general work of the Orphanage for the year 1950.

First—we will briefly review finance highlights. Total receipts were \$27,690.37. Of this amount \$7,569.89 was received from Estates and placed in the Endowment Fund. The total maintenance contributions reached an all time high—\$20,090.48—with the result that for the 24th consecutive year we report a surplus. This is noteworthy considering the high cost of all necessities. "The Endowment Fund is increasing rapidly and the total now stands at \$137,666.21. This rapid increase indicates our people are fully aware of the value of the work now being carried on by the Orphanage.

On August 31st, following a long term as Matron, Miss Beers retired. The Trustees were most fortunate in securing as her successor Miss Margaret MacLean. Miss MacLean, by her outstanding ability and her devotion to duty, soon proved herself to be indeed worthy of the appointment. "The progress in the School, with Miss Jane Johnstone as Teacher, has been most satisfactory. In addition to regular classes, Miss Johnstone gave instruction in music with gratifying results.

"Since our last annual meeting, as you will note today, there has been a considerable amount of re-decorating and re-furnishing. For generous contributions to this work we are deeply indebted to the following fine organizations. The Ladies' Auxiliary of the Benevolent Irish Society. The L. O. E. Entrance Examinations
We have been informed that some schools on Prince Edward Island use the Grade X reader in both Grades IX and X in order that those preparing for entrance examinations to Prince of Wales College may be more familiar with the text when they take the Literature examination. We've been wondering if this policy is fully approved by the Board of Education, if it is not approved but more or less tolerated, or if it is forbidden and the Board of Education is not acquainted with the facts. If this procedure has the blessing of the Board, then the fact should be more widely known so that other schools may also take advantage of it. If it is forbidden, then action should be taken to make sure that all schools conform strictly to existing regulations. Iran Offers
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East oil crisis:
1. Iranian oil officials ordered the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company's acting manager, A. E. Mason, out of his office.
2. Prime Minister Mohammed Mossadegh sent a personal message to President Truman promising his utmost to maintain oil production, and accusing the company of influencing its British employees who refused to work under the new National Company.
3. The Iranian Government protested against increased British troop concentrations in neighboring Iraq and the presence of the British cruiser Mauritius in Iraqi waters directly off Abadan.
4. Tehran buzzed with rumors that Soviet Russia might soon free \$12,000,000 owing Iran for wartime help to Russian occupation troops. This would be the first known Russian intervention, direct or otherwise, so far in the dispute.
5. Eighteen American oil companies drafted plans to rush oil to Western Europe. If Iran's refineries and fields are shut down, an informed official in Washington said the plan had U. S. Government approval and is "nearly ready to go."
6. Directors of Iran's new National Oil Company intensified appeals for the 2,800 British specialists of the A.I.O.C. to stay on at their old pay rates and called on Iranians to treat all foreign
