# Crapaud To Have First Carnival In 8 Years

CRAPAUD — Crapaud will stage an ice carnival Feb. 10, at the Crapaud Sports Center (formerly the Crapaud Rink). Included in the program will be a Special Circus for authentic costumes of 1864. Special prizes, commemorative of Centennial, about inform us the successful contestant in each of the four sections of the ice area will be decorated with Centennial decorations and a band is expected to be in attendance to entertain before judging commences and also afterwards.

At a later date, a second ice area was built but there is a record of just how long this has lasted, but later, for a number of years this community was without a rink.

NEW RINK — In 1946, a meeting was called for the purpose of discussing the building of an indoor rink in Crapaud, but it was not until 1953 when a second meeting was called and a decision was taken on this project.

On February 9, 1955, the first ice carnival was held in this newly constructed rink, at which time over a hundred and twenty-seven entries were in costume and five hundred and thirty spectators attended. The Centre has arranged an annual Ice Carnival. It is hoped that the next Ice Carnival will be one to be particularly remembered.

## Returns High In TB Seal Campaign

Dr. F.A. MacMillan, president of the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League, said yesterday the 1963 Christmas seal campaign has surpassed the 1962 contributions by five per cent, and there is still three full weeks remaining in the drive.

Latest figures show contributions so far this year amounting to \$13,155. The drive officially closes on Feb. 29.

Well pleased, Dr. MacMillan said "This year's increase reflects the interest and concern of hundreds of voluntary tuberculosis workers as well as an enlightened populace."

In P.E.I., said Dr. MacMillan, where community-wide tuberculosis testing, X-ray clinics and X-ray programs are the cornerstone of case finding, it is becoming more obvious each year that such surveys serve as a focal point for both community and individual education concerning prevention of TB. It is recognized throughout North America that voluntary associations are an invaluable adjunct to governmental agencies in the control of TB.

Funds from the Christmas Seal campaign are used principally to support case finding, because early detection of TB is the best method of prevention.

## Eracting Ski Tow In Emvyle Area

As a result of requests from ski enthusiasts Industry and Natural Resources Minister Lew Rossiter, announced yesterday a ski-tow is being erected at Emvyle, Lot 65, and is expected to be in operation Saturday and Sunday.

Mr. Rossiter said members of the Parks division of his department have found a good ski run at Emvyle, near the farm of John Cusack and Robert C. McDermott.

There were some requests that skiing be revived at Strathgarny, but the location is considered hazardous and a new run was found.

## Ferry Traffic Outlook Slated For Discussion

Industry and Natural Resources Minister Lew Rossiter said yesterday, a meeting has been called between Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick government officials with representatives of the West Point ferry company.

At the meeting, to be held in Summerside on Wednesday, a traffic potential survey in connection with the ferry will be discussed. The report was compiled by the Maritime Transportation Commission.

Mr. Rossiter said the meeting will determine whether further steps are warranted in the proposal.

## Talks Continue On 12-Mile Limit

OTTAWA (CP) — Another round of talks was held Wednesday between a Canadian and American negotiators seeking to come to terms for United States acceptance of Canada's proposal to declare a 12-mile fishing limit this year.

Fisheries Minister Robichaud said afterwards that he hopes the matter will be settled at another meeting tentatively planned for next Wednesday in Ottawa.

"We originally hoped that today's meeting would be the last one," he said in an interview Wednesday night. However, another session was planned to iron out details on both sides.

Canada now has a three-mile limit from which former fishermen are barred. It announced last summer that a 12-mile limit will be imposed about mid-May of this year.

A luncheon served by the students, followed the meeting, which was chaired by the president, Vera Mallet.

## Spacewoman Reveals Moon Trip Possible

LONDON (Reuters) — Russian spacewoman Valentina Tereshkova said on arrival here for a three-day visit that her next destination may be the moon.

"I am always ready to go to the moon," she said. "We have a number of women cosmonauts in training, but if they think me fit I will be glad."

"Women are as fit to fly in space as men," she said.

Waiting crowds cheered her when she arrived at London Airport from Moscow in a Russian jet airliner.

Valentina, her arms loaded with bouquets of flowers, laughed happily for television cameras at the airport.

The blue-eyed wife of Soviet cosmonaut Mal Andrian Nikolayev was the height of femininity in a soft grey Russian lamb coat and high-heeled black shoes. Her makeup was subtle and her rail-polish a vivid pink.

Her visit to receive Thursday the British Interplanetary Society's gold medal for her space achievement—orbiting the earth 48 times last June — is likely to last several weeks.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says late Thursday evening skies were cloudy with all except northern New Brunswick and Cape Breton Island, southeasterly winds were bringing mild air to the southern region to the teens with Campbellton at 10 p.m. reporting a reading of 13 degrees.

A deepening disturbance centred near New York City late Thursday evening is expected to move rapidly northeastward and then eastward passing through the Bay of Fundy late this morning and by evening be centred well east of Sydney. Rain will move into Nova Scotia early today and occasionally be mixed with snow at first. Southern New Brunswick can expect a mixture of snow and rain with northern New Brunswick receiving only snow.
