The business of the day was dispatched most harmoniously, and the proceedings exhibited throughout an example of good humor and kindness, highly creditable to the numerous party brought together upon this interesting occasion.

The business of the meeting was closed by an acclamation of thanks to the chairman for his conduct in the chair, and three hearty cheers for the Royal Agricultural Society.

We cut the following paragraph from the last London Illustrated News. The *Islander*, a few weeks since, described the Society referred to as "one of the humbugs of the day," and composed of "individuals without influence." The very names of the parties mentioned below give the best refutation to this slander.

COLONIAL REFORM SOCIETY.—The members and friends of this society dined together at the Trafalgar Tavern, Greenwich, on Wednesday evening; the Right Hon. Lord Monteagle presiding, supported by Lord Lytton, the Bishop of Oxford, Sir W. Molesworth, M. P., Hon. W. Wrottesley, Hon. F. Scott, M. P., Hon. F. Campbell, M. P., Mr. J. Hume, M. P., Mr. H. Aglionby, M. P., Mr. Sadleir, M. P., Mr. J. Wyld, M. P., the Rev. Mr. Jackson (Bishop elect of New Zealand) Mr. Simeon, M. P., Mr. De Salis, Mr. Lowe, Dr. Black, Mr. Thring, Mr. C. B. Adderley, M. P., &c. In the course of the evening the meeting were addressed by the noble chairman, Sir W. Molesworth, the Bishop of Oxford, Lord Lytton, Mr. Hume, Mr. Adderley, Mr. Sadleir, and Mr. Lowe. The latter gentleman, who is a resident of New South Wales, and a member of the Legislature of that Colony, in a very eloquent speech, advocated the rights of the Australian Colonies to self-government, and deplored the policy of Earl Grey, which would ultimately tend to put to hazard the prosperity of all our Colonies, and to do away with that feeling of devoted loyalty which now especially characterised the Australian colonies.

It was our intention to have given in the last or present number of the EXAMINER, a sketch of a recent tour made by us through King's County, in the course of which we had opportunities of addressing six or seven numerous attended public meetings, convened at our request, with a view that we might explain the proceedings of the House of Assembly, and occurrences since its prorogation, having reference to the long agitated question of Responsible Government. We have with great reluctance abandoned this intention, because a detail of our route and the meetings would take up greater space than we can at present afford to give to it. Suffice to say, that King's County is unflinchingly steadfast in its attachment to liberal principles—that the conduct of the House of Assembly has not only met with unqualified approbation, in every quarter, and village, but every re-

ference to that conduct has been hailed with rapturous applause. We met with only one individual in the whole county opposed to the views of the Assembly, and his opposition is accounted for by the fact of his having been lately appointed by Sir Donald Campbell to a commissionership of Small Debts. If the *Islander* has not made any greater impression, as we believe it has not, in Prince and Queen's Counties, than it has effected in King's County, notwithstanding its gratuitous circulation, we fear that the hearts of the Compact will grow sick in hoping for a reaction, and speedily discover that they have paid somewhat dearly for their whistle in employing a man such as Duncan Maclean, sunk irremediably in public estimation, to blacken the character of seventeen members of the Assembly so lately entrusted with the confidence of their constituencies.

EXTRACT FROM A LETTER RECEIVED BY LAST MAIL, DATED LONDON, JULY 19.—"I was sorry to observe by your letter that your political horizon was again cloudy, but as the affairs of the Island have been recently discussed in the House of Commons, and the Ministers have pledged themselves to give you Responsible Government, I hope it will not be long till you have sunshine and prosperity."
