## Tying Salmon And Trout Flies Keeps Him Busy

**MATAPEDIA** Que. (CP)—In a tiny workshop at this Quebec-New Brunswick border community you can find the hide of a sacred African monkey, feathers from a Cingalese peacock, and the tail of a golden pheasant from Hong Kong.  
These, and some 300 other exotic imports, are used by craftsman Al. Lapointe to satisfy the demands of Canadian and United States anglers who visit this famed salmon-fishing region.  
Al's business is making salmon and trout flies to fool the wily fish that abound in the nearby rivers of Quebec's Gaspé Peninsula and northern New Brunswick.

He makes hair or feather flies for salmon fishing in scores of different varieties. Each standard pattern has its own listed name. Some of the most popular feather flies are the Black Fairy, the Jock Scott and the Thunder and Lightning. There is also a Lapointe special.  
To create a Jock Scott, the fly-maker uses 26 different components and a large amount of sheer craftsmanship.  
The feathers, furs, and other materials that fill the cupboards and drawers of his workshop, are originally imported from many different countries such as India, England, France and Australia.  
In addition, Al uses the tails of deer killed nearby. They come in handy for making the wings of the flies.

He also produces more than 500 patterns of trout flies. Any he hasn't already placed on his list, can be made if the formula or sample is provided by the angler.  
Flymaking has kept him busy, and happy, for the last 10 years, and he is developing a mail-order export business. A native of Fredericton, he now has made his home at this little community and works just a short distance from the meeting place of the Restigouche and Matapedia Rivers.  
"This is a year-round job for me," he explains. "But sometimes, in the winter, if I want a change I repair some fishing rods or radio sets."

## Big Federal Budgetary Surplus During August

OTTAWA (CP)—The government chalked up a \$14,300,000 budgetary surplus August, boosting the surplus figure for the first five months of the 1956-57 fiscal year to \$344,700,000.  
Finance Minister Harris reported Friday in his monthly treasury statement that the August surplus compares with a \$18,000,000 deficit in the corresponding month a year ago. The five-month figure was more than three times the \$114,000,000 surplus in the same period of 1955.  
Mr. Harris also reported that the government's old age pension fund went into the red by \$3,100,000 in the month.  
Last April the finance minister forecast a surplus of \$113,000,000 for the current fiscal year. But government informants forecast last month that the actual surplus from Canada's expanding economy may be closer to \$300,000,000.

**HIGHER COLLECTIONS**  
Boosted by higher collections in corporation and personal income taxes, revenues in August rose to \$404,300,000 from \$342,200,000 in the same month in 1955. This increased revenues for the five-month period to \$2,017,600,000 from \$1,674,300,000.  
August expenditures rose to \$390,000,000 from \$360,200,000 a year ago. In the five months expenditures climbed to \$1,672,900,000 from \$1,569,300,000.  
Compared with August of last year revenues last month were up \$29,800,000. For the five months revenues were up by \$43,300,000 and expenditures by \$112,600,000.  
The cumulative deficit for the first five months of the present fiscal year totals \$9,300,000 compared with \$23,000,000 in the corresponding period a year ago. Deficits are covered by temporary government loans which later are written off as budgetary charges.

## Tells Court Of Brink's Holdup

BOSTON (AP)—Joseph J. (Specs) O'Keefe, who says he robbed Brink's, Inc., of \$1,219,000 cash with eight men now on trial, testified Wednesday as a prosecuting witness that the gang made at least 27 exploratory visits to Brink's before the crime.  
The 48-year-old O'Keefe said under cross-examination he made "at least" that many nighttime surveys between Dec. 1, 1948, and the date of the robbery, Jan. 17, 1950. Each time, he said, he was accompanied, and at one time or another all 10 others of those indicted went there with him.  
O'Keefe, in his fourth day on the stand in Suffolk Superior Court, represented himself as such an expert lockpicker that he never required implements more complicated than a sharpened icepick and a piece of celluloid to gain access to the money stronghold.  
In previous direct testimony, O'Keefe said the group did not depend on celluloid or icepick the night of the robbery but instead removed doorlock cylinders in advance and had keys made, then replaced the cylinders.

## Six Navy 'Copters To Aid Radar Line

OTTAWA (CP)—Six helicopters of the navy's anti-submarine helicopter squadron, HMCS Shearwater, are assigned to help the RCAF maintain the air-lift of personnel and equipment this autumn on construction of the mid-Canada radar line in the Labrador area.  
The six Sikorsky HO4S-3 helicopters, under the command of Cmdr. G. H. Marlow, Saskatoon, Sask., were withdrawn from sea exercises in the Bermuda area to help complete the line, defence headquarters said today.  
The aircraft were flown earlier this month to the navy's air station, HMCS Shearwater, at Dartmouth, N.S., where their sonar equipment was removed and other equipment to assist in northward transport duties was installed.  
The helicopters will be flown to the RCAF station at Knob Lake, in northern Quebec, Sept. 23-25. They will be manned and serviced by some 50 navy officers and men.

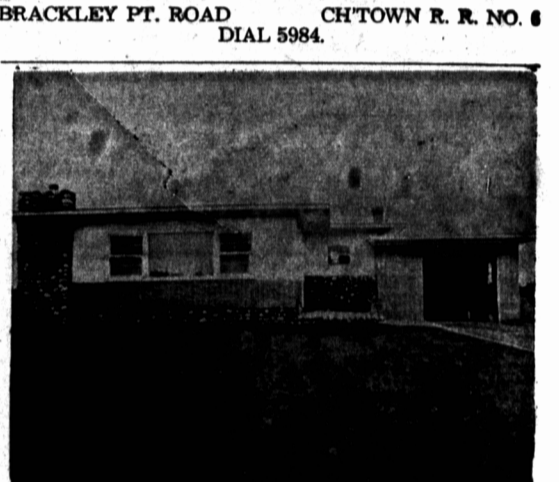
## Cayuga Sailor Admits Theft

VICTORIA (CP)—A 17-month investigation into the theft of \$14,522 from HMCS Cayuga while she was berthed at naval dockyard here ended in Esquimalt police court Wednesday when a 24-year-old sailor admitted stealing the money.  
Francis J. Cassidy, 24, of New-Town, Ont., 26 miles east of Toronto, was remanded to Sept. 24 for sentence.  
RCMP said the case was cracked when Cassidy gave himself up at HMCS Naden Gates two weeks ago as a deserter from the navy since Oct. 7, 1955.  
Cassidy later admitted taking the money.  
Cassidy was serving as quartermaster aboard the Cayuga on the day of the theft, April 23, 1955.  
None of the money, which was on the Cayuga to purchase supplies for a training course, has been recovered.
