

Islanders Score 5-3 Win Over Halifax

Outplay Visitors In Penalty Infested, Rousing Encounter

The Charlottetown Islanders shut off a winning streak for Halifax Saint Mary's at six games last night when they downed the visitors here over Forum ice by a 5-3 count in one of the hottest and most rugged contests witnessed here this season.

The victory sends Islanders' leadership in the Big Four league back up to 17 points over their second-place rivals, Saint Mary's.

In a penalty infested contest that saw a total of 26 awards handed out by referee Casey Bradshaw and Jackie Kane, it was a rousing contest that saw the Islanders outplay their opponents by a wide margin in the first period despite the fact that they broke even on the scoring at one goal each, with Eddie Daoust performing sensation-ally in the Halifax cage to turn aside 17 shots by Islanders while Hal Gordon was only called upon to handle three.

The second and third periods came up with one of the roughest displays of hockey witnessed over Forum ice this year, with six men filling the penalty box during one time and each Leo Lamoureux put off the bench by referee Bradshaw, following an uprising in the second period. During the fray, however, both teams banged home a brace more of goals each, with Islanders gaining two more with a reply in another rough and ready closing session.

Sharpshooters for the Islanders were Mac Beaton with two and Phil Vitale, Frank Bathgate and Howard Beaudry potting one each while Marcel Clements collected three assists, Bathgate and Bucko Trainor two each, Bruno Favero, Danny Horek and Jack Morrow one each.

Wally Black, Bill Watson and Bill Ford were the goalgetters for Saint Mary's with one apiece, while Diguier, McLaughlin, Campbell and Brown all collected an assist each.

Halifax iced 13 men, minus Johnny Myketyk, George McGregor and Cy Thomas, while Islanders were at a full 15-man strength but minus the services of Johnny Horek, out with a leg injury, and Jack "Spy" Ready.

Outshoot Halifax 17-3

Starting a revamped line of centre Frank Bathgate and wings Marcel Clements and Mac Beaton, Islanders started the ball rolling at the first 15 seconds of play when all three forwards figured in a roaring attack right from the faceoff to go right in on D'Aoust, Beaton beating him cleanly with a driving shot. Holding it over their opponents like a blanket, Islanders continued to swarm all around the Halifax net that saw D'Aoust kick out 12 shots in the same number of minutes of play while Gordon was not called upon to handle a shot during that time. gauldening by the Halifax custodian was the only thing that saved the score from piling up for the locals. Being skated around in circles for 15 minutes by the Islanders, Halifax finally broke into the scoring when Wally Black shoved the puck into the open net during a scramble in front of the Islanders cage. Gordon had come right out of his net to block a shot by Diguier, "Peanuts" McLaughlin also getting an assist on the play. Islanders outshot Halifax 17-3 on the frame.

Rough Play—10 Penalties Awarded

From the start of the second period on, play really roughened up and things began to happen that saw 10 penalties awarded, including two majors before the period ended. While Favero and Diguier were off for roughing at 1:02, Halifax took the lead for the first time in the game when Watson and Campbell teamed up on a nice play from the opposing blueline that had Gordon beaten all the way. The goal came at 2:49, and at 4:40 Pat Powers went off for cross checking and the Islanders made good the one man advantage to bang home two goals before Powers got back on the ice. Vitale got the first on a long screened shot from the blueline on a relay passout from Clements and Bathgate during a pressure attack at 4:37, and at 6:17, Beaton tipped in a screened shot by Bucko Trainor from about 30 feet out, who was set up on the play by Clements in another roaring attack.

Hot Uprising—Lamoureux Off Bench

From the midway mark of the frame on, the game broke wide open. Following a penalty to Travis for tripping at 10:28, Pat Powers and Phil Vitale really mixed it up, that cost them both majors for fighting and also involved coach Leo Lamoureux of Islanders, who was put off the bench for the night by referee Casey Bradshaw. The outbreak all started when Vitale and Black started roughing one another along the boards near the Halifax players' bench. Breaking off their brief duel, Vitale started to skate up the ice when Pat Powers jumped at him from behind and bore him to the ice where both were involved in a wrestling match and a flurry of blows that was finally broken up with the assistance of both referees and players. Coach Leo "Lion" Lamoureux became involved in the fray when he disputed the major award to Vitale with referee Bradshaw at the penalty box. Things got pretty hot between coach and official and Lamoureux was ordered off the bench for the night. That incident occurred at 13:54, and less than a minute later both Clements and Grabowski were ordered off for roughing, and 33 seconds later Trent Anderson and Howard Beaudry also landed in "sin bin" for the same offences, to swell the number of occupants to six.

Halifax Tie Score

While both teams were both playing four men a side, Eddie Brown tipped in a backhand shot that saw a fast break by Halifax that started just outside the opposing blueline, to tie up the score at 3-3.

Hostilities Continue

Hostilities commenced again at the 1:59 mark of the third period, with McLaughlin being chased for hooking and Hughie Campbell awarded a misconduct for arguing too strenuously over the award with referee Jackie Kane. With two Halifax players already in the penalty box, the game had the lid blown off again when Frank Grabowski was waved off for holding during a close scoring

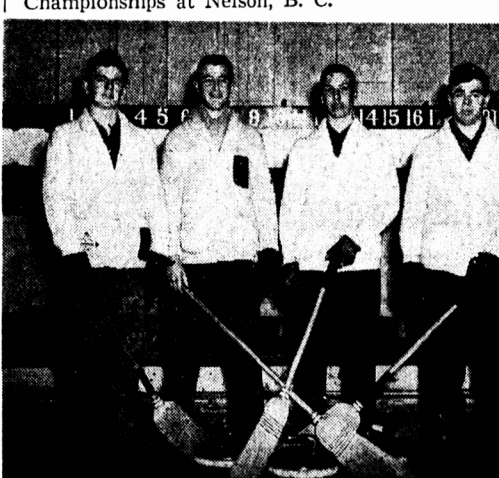

Musial Expects \$100,000 Salary

GARMISCH - PARTENKIRCH-EN, Germany, Feb. 6 — (AP) — Stan Musial said today he expects "somewhere in the neighborhood" of \$100,000 to swing his bat for St. Louis Cardinals this year.

The 1950 National League batting champion was coy about naming any specific figure which might embarrass his negotiations with Cardinal owner Fred Saigh.

But asked about reports that he is demanding \$100,000, Musial replied: "Well, somewhere in that neighborhood."

Only two players to get that much money for a single season are Joe DiMaggio of New York Yankees and Ted Williams of Boston Red Sox. Musial's salary last year called for \$50,000 plus another \$10,000 in bonuses.

Millionaires Defeat Glace Bay Miners 5-4

SYDNEY, N. S., Feb. 6 — (CP) — A weird exhibition of fisticuffs and of icing the puck featured a 5-4 victory by Sydney Millionaires over Glace Bay Miners in a Cape Breton Major Hockey League game here tonight.

The game got out of control in the scoreless second period when two match misconduct penalties and one misconduct were awarded.

In the second canto, Earl Frazier tripped referee Elliott, who imposed a minor penalty but changed it to a match misconduct when the player struck him.

Stan McCabe protested the action and attacked Elliott, receiving the gate for his pains.

Then Glace Bay threatened to leave the ice. When the game finally re-started Miners continually iced the puck, until Elliott gave Stan Robertson a penalty for delaying the game. Robertson skated over to the referee and offered a mock handshake—for which he received a misconduct.

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 6 — (AP) — Joe Louis meets Omello Agramonte of Cuba tomorrow night at Miami Stadium in a 10-round fight that Louis hopes will be the next-to-last before the return battle with Ezzard Charles for the heavy-weight title.

Trainer Mannie Seamon was enthusiastic about Joe's physical condition. The Brown Bomber weighed 207 pounds when he finished his heavy training yesterday.

"Joe's in great shape," Seamon said. "He's punching just as good with his right hand as he is with his left. And what I like best of all, he's vicious."

The ex-heavyweight champ meets Andy Walker in San Francisco, Feb. 23 and says he would like another crack at Charles in March because "he's as ready as I'll ever be" for a title fight.

Al Weill, international Boxing Club matchmaker who arrived here Saturday said:

"Charles don't want Louis until September. Ezzard is fighting Jersey Joe Walcott at Detroit and we've mapped out a fight for Charles with Joey Maxim in Chicago around June."

But Weill added: "We'll let Charles decide it. After all, he's the champion, and if he wants Louis, we'll be willing to put it on in March, April or May."

Despite rainy weather the last two days, promoters of the Louis-Agramonte fight were forecasting an attendance of 15,000 and a gross gate of \$50,000. The fight will not be broadcast or televised.

The local even-money odds that Louis would kyo the 26-year-old Agramonte in five rounds or less were pooh-poohed by Angel Lopez, manager of the Cuban champ.

"Everyone is talking about Louis knocking out Agramonte, but it is going to be just the opposite," declared Lopez. Agramonte can hit. He has knocked out 21 of his 40 opponents.
