

Glac Bay Defeats Halifax 3-1 In Rough And Fast Encounter

GLACE BAY, N. S., Dec. 18 (CP) — Glac Bay Miners played best when the pressure was on tonight and whipped league-leading Halifax Atlantics 3-1 in a rough and fast Maritime Major Hockey League game.

Backed by the stellar playing of goalie Don Lockhart, the cellar-dwelling Miners rifled in two goals in the first, added another in the second and outshot Atlantics 12-8 in the third, barely missing on many.

Johnny Raynak started the ball rolling at 1:58 on a slick play started by Neil Amadio and Don Keller, and Bullet Bob Verrier scored the second with only two seconds remaining on a pass-out from Pop Backor.

Miners were outshot 16-6 in that period but they reversed the score in the second, peppering Roy McMeekin with 11 shots while Lockhart had nine, none of them difficult.

Bill Burega scored in the second, assisted by Gordie Miller, in the first minute. Bob Bowness averted a shutout in the finale by slamming in the puck on a play set up by Billy Watson and Bill Ford.

"Archie will fight anyone," said Johnston. "I've got a champion who will chase after opponents. That's a switch, isn't it?"

"I'm going to talk to Norris about getting a crack at Rocky Marciano's heavyweight title."

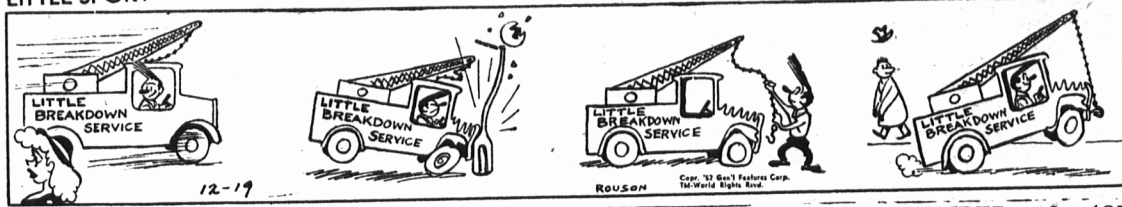
"We like Jersey Joe Walcott, too. I'll bet Archie will knock out Walcott quicker than Marciano does the next time."

Beliveau, Geoffrion Star As Canadiens Win 6-2 Victory Over Rangers

MONTREAL, Dec. 18 — (CP) — Jean Beliveau, the youngest Canadian would like to sign permanently, and Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion each blasted three goals for the hat trick tonight to give the Montrealers a 6-2 victory over New York Rangers.

A howling crowd of 14,641 saw the unusual double feat in a bristling, scrappy game in which two Montreal goals were disallowed and two major penalties were handed out culminating a rousing fight.

New York's goals were scored by Paul Ronty and Nick Mickoski in the second period, tying the game at that stage.

Beliveau, crack sharpshooter in the Quebec Senior Hockey League, was brought up from Quebec Aces for a three-game loan-lease stretch. He has refused to leave the team to jump to Canadiens.

Tonight he fitted into the first line with Maurice (Rocket) Richard and Bert Olmstead like he had been playing with them for years. Richard had a part in all three goals by Beliveau.

Canadiens' undefeated string now has reached six in which they collected 10 points of a possible 12.

Beliveau got his first goal half way through the opening period when he picked up a pass that caromed off Richard's stick, feinted goalie Chuck Rayner and then poked the puck in.

Geoffrion, NHL rookie of the year last season, came through five minutes later on a passout by Meger.

The disallowed goals came early in the second period—by Billy Reay and Bert Olmstead. Referee Jerry Olinski ruled a Montrealer was in the goal crease each time.

Rangers, whose veterans and rookies battled Canadiens all the way, then struck for their two seasons to go. The goal was shot by Gerry McNeil's glove and Ronty scored on Neil Strain's passout.

The big fight broke out then with Jim MacPherson of Canadiens and Allen Stanley of Rangers whaling away at each other just after rookie Ian MacIntosh was sent off for tripping.

Beliveau quickly drove in his second and less than two minutes later after MacIntosh had returned, rifled in his third.

Geoffrion's next two came in the final period, with Billy Reay and Paul Meger assisting for the third time.
