PEKING (Reuters) — Chinese Communist leaders stepped up their campaign against allegedly revisionist intellectuals and writers with an unprecedented attack Sunday on three local Communist newspapers.

The newspapers are chastised for publishing articles by Teng Tso, former managing director of the Peoples Daily, the main Chinese Communist party newspaper, who was accused of "singling the same tune as Khrushchev."

Defence Officials Release Figures

OTTAWA (CP)—The navy's combined Atlantic and Pacific fleets will number 22 active combat ships by this fall compared with 60 in 1963, defence officials said.

This number will increase gradually to 31 by 1971, however. The aircraft carrier Bonaventure will come out of year-long refit in April, 1967. Two more submarines will join the fleet, one in 1967 and the other in 1968. Two support ships will come into service in 1969 and four destroyers in 1970-71.

The defence department announced that Canadian-built frigates will see their last active service this summer.
