Charles 2 To 1 Favorite Over Champion Walcott In Title Bout Tonight

PHILADELPHIA, June 4 (AP)—Favored Ezzard Charles defies ring legend tomorrow night at Municipal Stadium in his bid to become the first former heavyweight boxing champion to regain the crown.

Standing squarely in his path is 38-year-old Jersey Joe Walcott of Camden, N.J., making the first defence of the title he wrenched from Charles on a seventh-round knock-out last July.

Promoter Herman Taylor now predicts a crowd of 35,000 and a gate of \$250,000, plus another \$175,000 for television and radio rights for the championship scrap.

Fair weather is predicted. The betting price was reported dropping from an early 3 to 1 favoring Charles to about 2 to 1 with Walcott money putting in an appearance.

Charles, heaviest in his career at about 182 pounds, loosened up briefly at his Pleasantville, N. J., training quarters today. Walcott, too, took a walk at Atlantic City, N. J. Both will remain at their seashore camps until they drive in for weigh-in.

All ring tradition says Charles can't do it. Jim Corbett, Bob Fitz-Simmons, Jim Jeffries, Schmeling, Jack Dempsey and Joe Louis failed before him in their bids to win back boxing's richest prize. But most of them were old men when they tried it. Charles, 30, is eight years younger than the slope-shouldered old daddy of six children.

It is ironic that Walcott, the underdog every time he fought for the title, should be in the position of proving "they never come back." Jersey Joe's career, dating back to 1930, was crowded with comebacks, retirements and comebacks in the cold, hungry days before he hit the jackpot on the fifth try.

Green Gables Golf Club Formed
At a meeting held at Cavendish on Sunday, June 1, the Green Gables Golf Club was formed. Mr. G. E. McGillivray, Supt. of the P.E.I. National Park, acted as chairman for the meeting. In his opening remarks, he pointed out the necessity of such a move, stating that:

"For some time it has been the feeling that in order to realize the full potential in the development of this course, an active membership body was required which would promote golf at Green Gables and make it more fully recognized as one of the outstanding golf courses in Canada and the United States."

Such an organization, said Mr. McGillivray, "would—(1) Establish golfing standards and local rules on Green Gables course; (2) Establish membership in the regional golf association; (3) Organize tournaments on the course and develop its competitive possibilities as a neutral course on 'the Island'; (4) Promote Green Gables course as a major tourist attraction and act as host to visiting golfers."

The superintendent reminded members that Green Gables course being in a National Park, must remain first and foremost a public course and must belong to the people of Canada. This fact would obviously place rather strict limitations on the rights and privileges which might be extended to members. The low membership fee of one dollar therefore was purely nominal and not too much would be expected in return.

In concluding his remarks, Mr. McGillivray said: "In promoting membership I must therefore appeal more to your sporting instincts and your interest and loyalty to Green Gables rather than to any great direct benefits which you may derive from such membership."

Membership is restricted to Island residents only and those wishing to join must do so on or before July 1. All members are entitled to one free practice round prior to the club championship and free green fees for this tournament.

Kell Makes Auspicious Debut With Red Sox, Blasting Homer In 5th

George Kell, key figure in Boston's \$1,000,000 deal with Detroit made an auspicious debut with the Red Sox yesterday, blasting a home run in the clutch as the Sox mauled the Cleveland Indians, 13-11 to regain first place from the Tribe.

Kell, who came to the Red Sox along with Hoot Evers, Dizzy Trout and Johnny Ligon in exchange for five players, homered with one on in the fifth inning to break a 9-9 tie. The Sox clinched the game with two more in the sixth.

Sharing the limelight with Kell were Evers, Trout and Billy Goodman. Kell and Evers drove through hit hard, gained credit for the victory, his second of the season. Goodman batted out five singles to feature Boston's 15-hit attack against Bob Feller, Steve Gromek and Mickey Harris.

The work of the three new Red Sox overshadowed a brilliant performance by Cleveland's Larry Doby. Doby hit for the rare "cycle," pounding out a homer, triple, double and single in five trips. The Cleveland outfielder drove home six runs.

Feller was driven to cover in the second inning during a five-run rally that gave the Red Sox an 8-2 lead. Evers highlighted the second inning rally with a two-run homer.

The New York Yankees tamed the Chicago White Sox, 6-3, to climb into third place in the American League's only other day game. Lefty Ed Lopat, with help from Bob Hogue in the ninth, gained credit for his second victory.
