GREAT RUSH ON THE C. P. R. Never before in the history of the Atlantic division of the C. P. R. was there such a rush of freight as on yesterday and Saturday night. From Friday at noon until Saturday evening there were something over 85 cars of freight sent west and this speaks well for the work of the checkers and gangs at the port. Yesterday, however, surpassed anything in regards to handling trains, and the C. P. R. officials were kept busy as well as the train crews. From Saturday night until last night there were something like 400 cars on the move between Sand Point and McAdam, and all day yesterday the special trains of freight rolled into Sand Point, and as fast as they would arrive they were taken care of by the yard men. The recent blockade has kept the handling of freight back some, and there will be a great rush of freight trains between this and the middle of April, there being a very large quantity of freight to arrive here to ship on the steam ships for the old country.—St. John Telegraph.

ENGLAND AND THE U. S.

Ex-Secretary Olney says an Alliance Would Be a Good Thing.

Richard Olney, ex-secretary of state for the United States, delivered a lecture at Harvard University a few days ago. His subject was "The International Isolation of the United States." Mr. Olney, after describing Washington's farewell injunction to avoid entangling alliances, and concluding that the rules should now be modified, said:

"There is no doubt with what nations we should co-operate. England, our most formidable rival, is our most natural friend. There is such a thing as patriotism for race as well as for country. Nothing less can be expected from the community of interests of Great Britain and the United States than that both shall use their great influence, not only for their common advancement, but for the betterment of the whole human race. "Though sometimes we may have such quarrels as only relatives and intimate neighbors indulge in, yet it may be said that the nearer future will see in our closer friendship a power for good that will be felt by all mankind."

Dr. Kennedy Moore, who was prominent in last year's attack on Dr. John Watson (Jan. McLaren), is renewing the assault. He has notified the Presbytery of South London that he will move at its next meeting to transmit to the synod, which meets at Liverpool on April 25 an overture complaining of the heresy in Dr. Watson's work "The Mind of the Master," and praying the synod to take steps to vindicate the honour and faith of the Church. It is an interesting coincidence that the synod will meet in Dr. Watson's own church.

The report of the Hawaiian minister of finance shows receipts for the biennial period of \$4,164,148, as against \$3,500,799 for the biennial period of 1894-5. The expenditures amounted to \$3,828,575, against \$3,662,886.
