The application of the Company has been favorably received, and arrangements are being made to accommodate them with all the space available.

It is said that Frank C. McNeally, the Saco, Me., Savings Bank clerk, was on the Island last week and crossed over to Pictou. McNeally who is but 19 years old, 5 feet 10 inches in height, and smooth-faced, was paid the munificent salary of \$2 a week for his services in the bank, but lived at the rate of \$25. Nihilists' Again.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 18.

A pamphlet that has been circulated in this city announces that the re-organization of the Nihilists has been fully successful, and that the centres of action are fully provided with everything requisite for the carrying out of their plans. Nihilism is fast spreading into Siberia where, during August 45 guards absconded and 23 prisoners escaped.

Rioting in Belfast.

BELFAST, Sept. 18.

A party of Orangemen, passing Greenacres, near Belfast, last night had an encounter with Nationalist residents. Three policemen tried to quell the disturbance, but were stoned and driven away. A force of police were sent, and the reinforcements aided the rioters, and peace was established. Ten of the principal participants were arrested.

The Printers' Strike.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 18.

The local Typographical Union met Saturday evening and considered the case of the printers' strike. It was decided to continue the strike until the proprietors of the paper submit to Union demands and refuse the use of any of their presses for printing stereotype plate matter.

Friday's Yacht Racing.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.

The result of Friday's yacht race has changed the course of betting on the America's cup race. Any amount of money is now offered at 100 to 75 against the Thistle. About \$600,000 will be wagered in New York. The friends of the Thistle are as confident as ever.

Shot and Killed.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Sept. 18.

A. Whitehouse accidentally shot and killed Geo. H. Gordon at Laramie Wednesday night. Both were students at Oxford, England. While hunting Whitehouse mistook his friend for a mountain lion and fired four shots at him, killing him instantly.

The Fisheries Protection.

OTTAWA, Sept. 18.

The fishermen express great satisfaction with the protection that has been afforded them this season. It is understood that the protection service will be maintained as long as the fishing lasts, irrespective of pending negotiations.

Through a Bridge.

DENVER, Sept. 18.

A Pueblo special says an engine and forward half of a train on the Atlantic and Pacific Railway went through a bridge near Needles, Col., Saturday. It is rumored the killed and injured number nearly fifty.

A Mackerel Strike.

HALIFAX, Sept. 18.

There is a big strike of mackerel between East Point and Port Hood. Canadian and American vessels made big hauls. One vessel took 400 barrels.

In the Naval Hospital.

HALIFAX, Sept. 18.

Midshipman Duntney and nine men, seriously injured by an explosion of rockets at Quebec, have been placed in the naval hospital.

Another Arrest.

DUBLIN, Sept. 18.

Manderville, charged with violation of the Crimes Act at the same time as O'Brien's offence was committed, has been arrested.

The Bridgewater Released.

HALIFAX, Sept. 18.

The American ship Bridgewater, seized at Shelburne for alleged violation of the Customs, is understood to have been released.

Fire Bugs.

PICTOU, Sept. 18.

An incendiary attempt was made early this morning to burn the Pictou Standard office.

HALIFAX, Sept. 18.

The ironclad Bellerophon has arrived from Quebec.

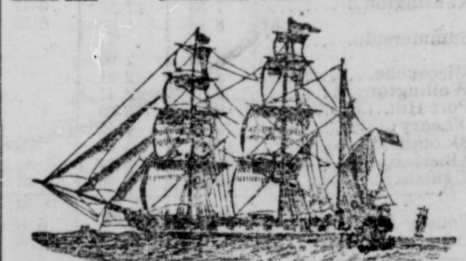
