A resident of Waterford was fined \$20 and costs for consuming liquor in a public place.

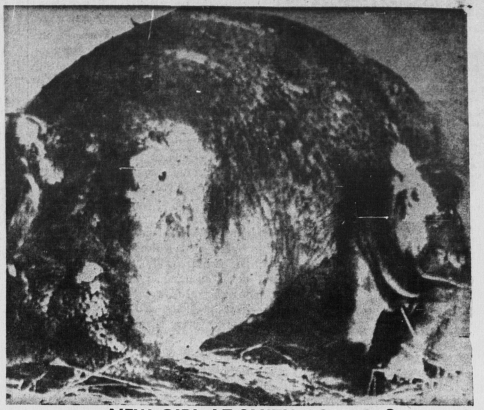
Stephen Aerebhal, Melville, Tignish, pleaded not guilty to a charge of selling liquor and the case was adjourned to Dec. 16.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says cold and dry air resulted in clear skies with temperatures already skidding toward the zero mark in western New Brunswick Wednesday evening. Elsewhere skies were mostly cloudy and a persistent but light snow was falling.

The dry air in the form of a high pressure area will move into the three provinces today, causing skies to clear in all regions.

Milder air will flow into the Maritimes in the wake of the high pressure area. The moderating trend will be felt in New Brunswick today and all three provinces Friday.

W. Prince Board Of Trade Again Urges Second Road

ALBERTON BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — A second highway to western Prince County via Freeland and across Foxley River to Cascumpe will once again be urged by the W. Prince Board of Trade it was decided at the regular meeting last night in Alberton.

First proposed eight or nine years ago and followed up every year since the proposed highway link would call for three or four miles of pavement and a bridge across Foxley River to connect with the Cascumpe highway leading to Alberton and Tignish.

In discussion leading to the motion it was noted that there is an extensive peat moss deposit under development in the area and it was also considered that the new highway would be more scenic than the Western Road and would become part of the Lady Slipper Drive.

It was decided to continue with the executive of the W. Prince Development Foundation until disbanded. Present members are Andrew Wells, J. W. Don Campbell, Gerald Gamble, Ray Handraban and Edward MacAusland.

The foundation, sponsored by the board of trade, carried out experiments in the growing of new crops and plans are to expand the project next year.

A letter was read from the director of tourism regarding a navigation course for boatmen interested in deep sea tourist fishing and one member present agreed to take the course.

E. C. Perry, Tignish, president of the West Prince Fish and Game Association reported on the work of the organization and asked for assistance from the board in obtaining picnic tables, signs for fishing ponds and streams and other improvements.

On motion the meeting approved support for the fish and game association.
