Before the government for decision is the question of whether a freight rate increase of 3.6 per cent should be allowed. Information Tuesday was that a hearing on this issue will be held about April 14 and that the cabinet is expected to make a decision on it before May 1.

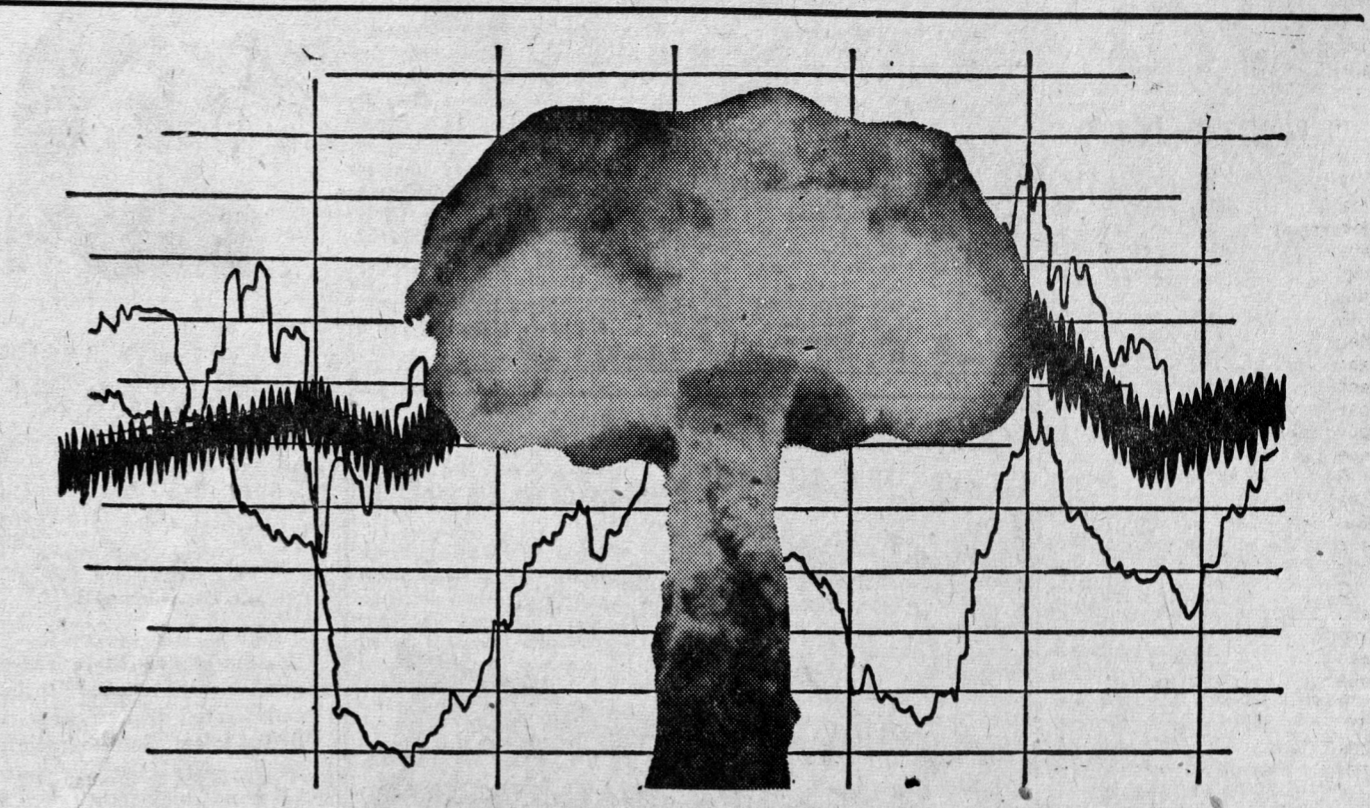
