SCOTT ACT CASES.—This forenoon H. J. Palmer, Stipendiary Magistrate for Queen's County, gave judgment in the matter of the Scott Act proceedings against Geo. A PROGRESSIVE TOWN.—New Glasgow, N. S., is one of the liveliest and most progressive of the smaller towns of the Maritime Provinces. While its population is under 4,000, about eight thousand less than Charlottetown, it boasts of waterworks and sewerage, electric light and telephones, asphalt sidewalks and well kept streets, and a daily newspaper. Next year it is to have an electric railway connecting New Glasgow, Trenton and Stellarton, with a branch to Westville, and a large public park is on the tapis.

JERUSALEM, ANCIENT AND MODERN.

A very interesting lecture will be delivered this evening at 7.20 in St Paul's schoolroom by Mr. J. Khadder, of Jerusalem. The lecture will be most interesting, as it will be delivered by one who has lived in the Holy City for the last 20 years, and who is well acquainted with the customs and habits of the east, as well as the language of the land. Mr. Khadder has delivered several lectures in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Cape Breton and some parts in this Island. His lectures are most interesting and instructive, and were highly appreciated by those who heard him, as may be seen from some of the testimonials which were given to him by different well-known men. The lecture will not be a dry one, but will be illustrated by many curiosities, oriental costumes and photographs which Mr. Khadder has been exhibiting in the Y. M. C. A. building this week, and he will also show the Mohammedan form of prayer, read a chapter from the Koran in Arabic, and sing Arabic songs and hymns with the accompaniment of the violin. We would therefore advise all who are interested in the history of Jerusalem and the manners and customs of the Holy Land not to miss the opportunity of hearing this interesting, instructive and amusing lecture which will be given by Mr. Khadder this evening. He will not only give an account of the history of ancient Jerusalem, but will also give valuable personal information respecting the present city, its population, wall, gates, sacred places, climate and situation, as well as the new railway which was lately constructed between Jerusalem and Joppa.
