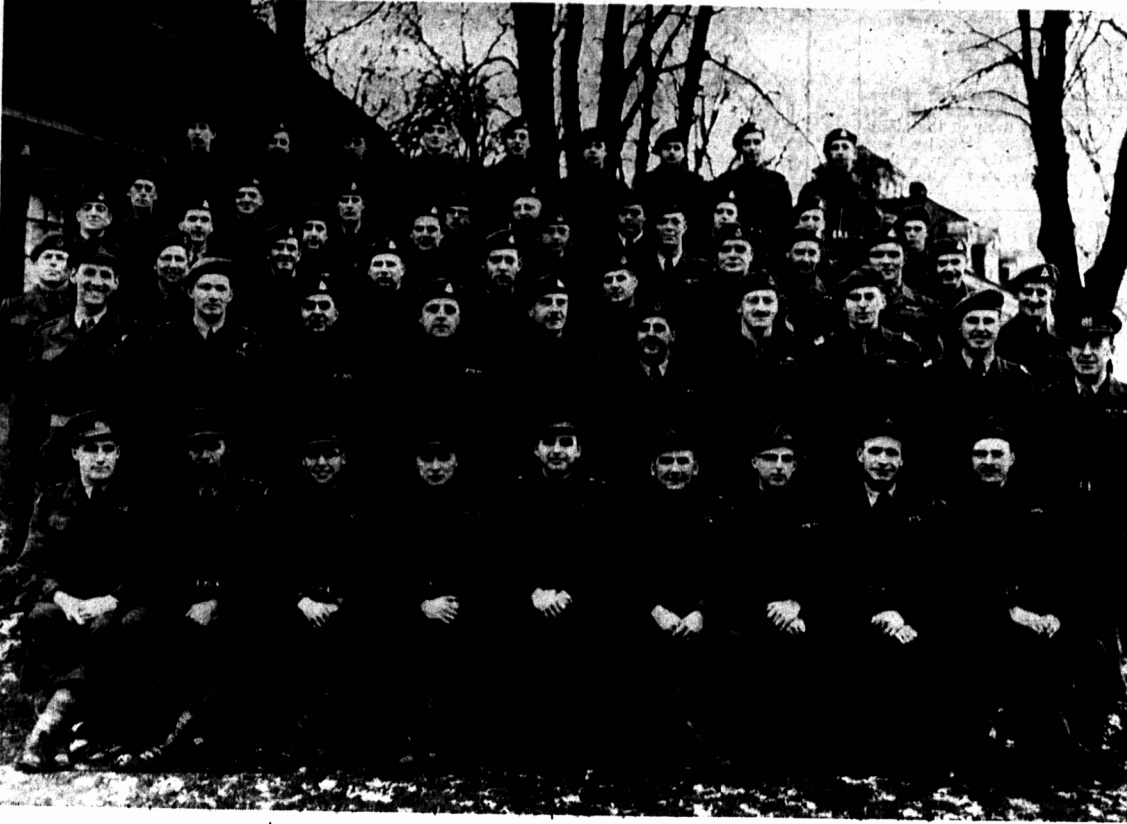

Montague Junior Board Of Trade Meeting Held

Last evening in the Town Hall, Montague, the recently organized Board of Trade held its first regular meeting since having received its charter on Oct. 8. President Mr. James Cudmore presided.

A large number of the town's young business men were in attendance and immediately decided upon a scheme to erect attractive roadside tables at strategic points on the roads near Montague. The board felt that there is a definite need for such tables, not only because of their usefulness to tourists but because they will be a definite asset to the scenic beauty of the countryside. A committee comprised of Gilbert Clements, Arnold Wightman, Richard Knox and John Shaw was appointed to investigate further and have definite plans and computation of the approximate cost of the two such tables drawn up for the next meeting.

It was decided upon the motion of Gilbert Clements seconded by Dr. Ings that all members arriving late for regular meetings be fined 25 cents.

It was decided after considerable discussion that all regular meetings will be held on the fourth Monday of each month and all supper meetings on the second Monday of each month commencing in January.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

British Try Private On Torture Charge

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — The British army put a private in the Kenya regiment on trial Monday on charges of torturing a Kikuyu woman to get information about the anti-white Mau Mau terrorists.

The private, Leslie Arthur Hughes, pleaded not guilty before a court martial to three charges of mistreating the woman, a prisoner, Wambui Njoroge.

The prosecutor, Lt. - Col. C. Parker, told the court police brought the woman to a guard post atop an 80-foot tower for questioning. Parker charged Hughes, second in command at the post, beat the woman with a cane, had her feet tied to the floor and her pierced ear lobes tied to either side of the tower. Then, he related, the private slapped the woman, causing her ear lobes to tear and bleed.

Finally, he charged, Hughes threatened the woman would be buried alive unless she gave information.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—The cause of lung cancer is not known but "after thorough debate we refrain from pointing an accusing finger at tobacco," the president of the American College of Chest Physicians said Sunday.

Dr. William A. Hudson of Detroit said "no specific agent" should be accused but rather that "there are many factors involved."

He spoke at a convention of members of the college meeting before the American Medical Association convention begins today.

Dr. Hudson said "the disease may be due to a combination of agents we have not yet been able to assemble in the right order."

Cancer of the lung is curable, he said, and the number of patients who have survived a number of years after it was diagnosed is increasing.

Annual Coronation Ball Held Last Night At Prince of Wales College

The annual Coronation Ball held at Prince of Wales College last evening was highlighted by one of the loveliest and most impressive ceremonies ever witnessed in that auditorium. Students who had looked in at four-thirty in the afternoon, seeing only a basketball game in progress, and a group of tired looking students groping their way through a maze of crepe paper, tacks, Scotch tape and ladders, were amazed at the transformation a few hours later. Red, white and blue streamers, in what seemed to be the thousands, were festooned against a back-drop of silver crowns.

At ten-fifteen, the master-of-ceremonies, David McDonald, introduced to the student body, a former student of Prince of Wales, now our Premier, the Honourable A. W. Matheson, who had kindly consented to officiate. The Royal Family then made their entrance to the strains of the college song, "Memories of Old Prince of Wales". Leading the procession were two tiny flower girls, Anita MacIsaac and Mary Bernard, who were arrayed in long dresses of pink and white, and carried bouquets. They were followed by two small page-boys, Peter MacKinnon and Jamie Kennedy, who were dressed in purple and velvet suits and carrying the royal crown. Directly preceding the King and Queen, were the Prince, Jack Williams, and the Princess, Miss Constance Chandler, who looked like a fairy-tale princess in a gown of pale blue. Finally, the royal couple, Miss Kathy Craig, and Doug Cudmore, made their long awaited appearance, the Queen, truly regal and radiant in sparkling white.

The entire party ascended to the stage, where they were met by the Premier. The first page carried the King's crown to him, and he placed it on the head of the new King of Prince of Wales. A second page bore the Queen's crown, and it, in turn, was placed on her head. Following the coronation, the Royal Family were the recipients of many beautiful gifts, made possible through the courtesy of the following firms: R. T. Next, seated on the steps of the stage, the Royal Family received the homage of Premier and Mrs. A. W. Matheson, members of the faculty and the student body.

Dancing followed, led off by the Royal Pair and their attendants, not the least of whom were the little flower-girls and pages. Music for the evening was supplied by

the Downtowners. Chaperones included Mr. Tom Lothian, Mr. and Mrs. Dick Matheson and Mr. and Mrs. Earl Wonnacott.

At the close of the evening, students were unanimous in declaring the affair one of the best ever staged. The secret of the King's and Queen's identity was cleverly kept, which added to the general interest. The social committee are to be congratulated on the success of their efforts. The prediction in P. W. C. "News and Views" was correct — "The Coronation Ball was, indeed, "the most, to say the least."
