LIQUOR TRAGEDIES.

The sad death of John McPhee of Orwell, whether we are to accept the finding of the coroner's jury, or the still more serious charge that has since been made on oath, evidently had its origin in the unlawful sale of liquor. In its primary as well as its broader aspects it is another whiskey tragedy. How many of these we have had in our fair province. The Scott Act, under which King's County is at present, imposes a fine of fifty dollars for illegal selling, but how sadly inadequate this seems when human life is thus sacrificed as a result.

But, as we have said, this is but one of two solutions of the mystery that hangs around the Orwell tragedy. Another and much graver charge is impending, and should there be any possible foundation for this, which all must be most reluctant to believe, there is equally the trail of the liquor serpent in the gloomy background.

Whiskey and crime go so much together that they seem to be almost inseparable in communities such as ours where the traffic is under ban of the law. It is this fact that serves to strengthen and increase the conviction that the only safety of the land is to be found in hunting down every illicit vender until there is no place left in all the Province where strong drink can be found.

It is indeed true that crime would still exist if liquor were banished, but it is quite apparent that it would exist in very greatly diminished volume. Many lives would be spared that now perish miserably, and many who have the guilt of blood on their hands and consciences would be living honest and respectable lives. The emphatic lesson of it all is to redouble our energies in the enforcement of law against the sale of liquor.

It is at least apparent that but for the unlawful traffic three prisoners now awaiting trial in the jail would be enjoying their liberty and a man now dead and buried would be still in the enjoyment of life.

We were in error on Saturday in attributing to Sir Richard Cartwright a desire to have the Senate wholly or partly elective. The full report of this speech shows that he is opposed to making the Senate elective. He would reduce the number of Senators to seventy-two, giving Ontario, Quebec, and the Maritime Provinces, and the Northwest respectively each twelve, apparently to be chosen by those great divisions, and have twenty four more appointed by the Federal Government. Of course any such change would require the consent of the Provinces, which in the case of the Maritime section might be a matter of some difficulty.

SUPERVISED PLAYGROUNDS.

The Women's Council of Halifax have undertaken to provide one or two playgrounds on a small scale with proper supervision, as object lessons for the people of that city in order that the citizens may see the uses and advantages of such places of amusement and recreation and provide them on a more extensive scale. Mrs. McNab who takes a deep interest in the welfare of the children writes to the Halifax Recorder on the subject setting forth the importance of the matter as she sees it.

If we pause but a moment to consider it, the importance of the scheme will readily appear. Most of the children of the modern city have no other or better place to play than on the streets, among other children good and bad, without any one parents or teachers, to look after them. We all realize that these are not the conditions that we would choose, but children must play, and there is often no other chance for them to get the fresh air or any recreation but on the street.

The plan is to have playgrounds laid off that shall be convenient of access, and equipped with the ordinary means of recreation such as boys love, where games and sports can be carried on and with some responsible person in charge so that order shall be maintained and the games and amusements be properly conducted.

If we teach boys to play honestly, fairly and to observe some sort of courtesy in their play, we are contributing in no small way to their education as well as to make them healthy and happy. Very few persons, perhaps realize how much of the formation of his character as a man in after years, has been made on the playground. The movement for supervised playgrounds is, we think, worthy of earnest attention and of adoption.

The case of the lost children of Bayfield, N. B. who absolutely disappeared, leaving no trace, naturally causes suspicion of murder. And yet it is quite possible that they may have fallen into some well or pond which would for a time entirely hide their bodies from view. It seems improbable that such young children could have wandered far enough to have fallen a prey to wild beasts.
