THE HELEN HEPRING SCHOLARSHIP

The Helen Herring Scholarship of \$500.00 will be awarded to a student from Prince Edward Island, who by September, is enrolled in the final year of a University program leading to a degree

in Home Economics.

NORTH ATLANTIC TREATY ORGANIZATION

The aim of NATO Fellowship Program is to

promote study and research leading to publication on aspects relevant to the North Atlantic Alliance. For Scientific and Environmental questions there exist separate programs. Each fellow will be awarded the sum of 23,000 Belgian francs per month (or the equivalent in the currency of any other member state). Grants may be extended from two to four months to six months.

Wilson Harris, a Visiting Fellow in Afro-American English Studies at Yale University, will be delivering a public lecture on Caribbean Literature on Tuesday, March 20, at the University of Prince Edward Island. Mr. Harris will speak in the Faculty Lounge of Main Building at 8:00 p.m.

Born and educated in British Guiana, Mr. Harris spent the early part of his career as a land surveyor. He led many survey parties into the heart of British Guiana rainforests, and from 1955 to 1958 was the Senior Surveyor for the government of British Guiana.

Since then he has been Writer-in-Residence at the Universities of the West Indies, and Toronto. He was a Commonwealth Fellow at the University of Leeds (1971), Visiting Lecturer at the State University of New York at Buffalo (1970) Visiting Professor at the University of Texas at Austin (1972) and was Guggenheim Fellow for 1973 during which he studied contemporary comparative literature.

Mr. Harris is the author of a number of books, including "Age of the Rainmakers", "Palace of the Peacock", "Eye of the Scarecrow", and "The Tree of the Sun".
