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

CITIES IN THE WEST

Some Interesting Statistics

By an Islander on the way Home.

Having arrived home lately after an absence of some time from the fast growing cities of Duluth and West Superior, permit me space in your widely circulated journal and I will endeavor to give some slight sketches of the growth and industries of those places. Beginning with Duluth, which is situated at the head of Lake Superior on the Minnesota side, it is a city of 47,000 inhabitants. Its chief resources are derived from lake traffic, wholesale commission and real estate. It possesses some fine buildings, prominent among them being the Spaulding Hotel, Lyceum, Chamber of Commerce and the First National Bank. Its lake traffic consists chiefly of passenger, coal and wheat, the latter being transhipped by steam elevators of which there are seven in number. It is accessible by seven lines of railway. Conspicuous at the head of these is the new Union Depot built recently at a cost of \$175,000. West Duluth, four miles distant, is the manufacturing centre on this side of the bay. It has four large plants, the principal one I might mention would be the Minnesota Iron Car Company which employs about 400 men. Crossing over the bay we come to the thriving city of West Superior. It is a city of seven years growth. But it has nevertheless a population of 30,000. Its resources are the same as those of Duluth. It possesses high and level streets, with the latest improved street car system. It has also fine buildings and business blocks, the foremost being the Ritchie, New York and Boston Block, and the West Superior Hotel. It is destined to be the great manufacturing centre of the North-west. It has already a dozen or more large plants, the principal ones being the Kentucky Steel Plant, the Libelle Wagon Works, West Superior Iron and Steel Company's works, and the famous American Steel Barge Company's works, builders of the celebrated whale-backs, of which your readers are already aware. These industries alone give employment to 400 or 500 men each, besides a 3,000 barrel per day flour mill, and another of the same capacity in course of erection. Another great industry in this North-west is the lumber business, of which I will write on some future occasion.

Considering it time to pay a visit to my native land, I will make a few remarks on my journey homewards. There are several different lines to come by. Choosing the Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic to St. Ignace, thence we cross the Strait, which is seven miles wide, by steam barge, and arrive at Meckinaw City. Leaving there over the Grand Rapids and Indian Rail-way we pass through a fine agricultural and fruit-growing country, and arrive at Detroit, Mich. Transferred there across the river by barge, we are on the Canadian side. Leaving Windsor by way of the Grand Trunk we pass through a rich and prosperous-looking country, and touch at several fine cities along this line, principal among them being London, Legerston and Hamilton. Catching glimpses here and there of the blue waters of Lake Ontario, we arrive at Niagara. We are now within hearing distance of this American wonder, the Niagara Falls. Crossing over on the Suspension Bridge to the American side we might utter with J. S. Buckingham:

No fleets can stop thy progress, no armies bid thee stay.
But onward, onward, onward thy march still holds its way.
The rising mist that veils thee as thy herald goes before,
And the music that proclaims thee in the thundering cataract's roar.

Leaving the Suspension Bridge depot over the New York Central and Hudson River Railway, the great four-track road, we pass through Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse and Troy to Albany, where we change for Boston over the Boston and Albany road, arriving there after a journey of sixty-four hours. After spending several days in this great seaboard city we resume our journey, taking the Boston and Maine Railway to St. John, N. B., thence the Intercolonial Railway to Point du Chene, where we find the commodious steamship Northumberland in readiness to carry us across the Straits. Summerville is reached, and we are soon on board the train again for Charlottetown, remaining there for the night. The next day being market day, we took the opportunity of visiting the markets and other places of interest. We make the evening train for Souris, the point of our destination, arriving there in due time. Proceeding from the depot we note that through the village some changes have taken place, notably in house building; but, judging from appearances, a vast difference exists between the business of P. E. Island and that of the free land of Uncle Sam.

News Notes.

A carpet tacking party is the late Missouri invention for evening festivities.
A veterinary college will be established in connection with Queen's University, Kingston.
About 7,000 votes were given to Mrs. Ada M. Bittenbender for the office of Supreme Judge of Nebraska.
A Mexican has unearthed a box of gold worth \$10,000 in Baniham, Texas. Santa Anna is said to have buried it.
On Wednesday night a mob entered the jail at Layville, La., and lynched two persons who had murdered a Jewish pedler.
At Obzanka, Poland, robbers broke into the house of a wealthy Jew named Feibel and murdered the whole family, consisting of eight persons.
Mrs. A. T. Stewart paid \$500 for a pair of lace curtains, and the residence of Robert Garrett, of Baltimore, boasts curtains that cost \$200 a yard.
The Princess Hereditary of Meininge, who was so beautiful in her youth that she was known as the "Venus of the Hohenzollerns," has been one of the high passengers abroad who has suffered lately from the gripple. She is Emperor William's oldest sister.
Cates and Charles, arrested at the Anarchist headquarters at Walsell, Eng., where paraphernalia used in the manufacturing of bombs was alleged to have been found, were arraigned on the 8th and remanded for further hearing. It is expected that more arrests will be made. Marie Fielcke, arrested at the anarchists' apartments, was released. It is understood she has made a confession which will be used against the other prisoners. The police have discovered a secret foundry for the manufacture of bombs and the place where the explosives are made.

A Calcutta despatch says: The government has pardoned the leader and shortened the terms of the band of female convicts at the penal settlement, Port Blair, Andaman Islands, for heroic conduct on the 2nd of November last. The woman on that day formed a human life line from the beach out into the sea, and by almost superhuman effort rescued six men from the steamer Enterprise wrecked in a cyclone. These six were the only members of the crew saved.
The Parisian arrived at Halifax at noon on Saturday, making the quickest run on record from Montreal to Halifax. She left Montreal at 4 p. m. on New Year's day, and there is four hours difference in time between that place and Halifax, her actual time was seven days. This despite the rough weather which has been reported by other steamers. The best previous time was made by the Vancouver of the Dominion Line, which arrived at Halifax on Friday evening. The Parisian brought seven saloon, nine intermediate and thirty-one steerage passengers to land at Halifax, and has thirty passengers for Portland.

A Contradiction.

Sir.—Allow me to contradict a statement made by a party signing himself "Belfaster," in the Patriot of Jan'y 2nd, to the effect that on the last sitting of the County Court in Eldon Public Hall, the fires had to be kindled by the bailiff. Referring to his statement that the hall has been under the control of two or three people in Eldon, I might add that such is not the case. There has always been a board of five directors to manage the affairs of the hall, appointed by the stockholders at the annual meeting.
