LAURIER AND PROHIBITION.

Temperance Deputation to go to Ottawa.

TO EMPHASIZE THE IMPORTANCE OF THE MAJORITY.

The Quebec Election Methods to be Investigated.

TORONTO, Oct. 21.—Temperance people are going to Ottawa at once for the purpose of drawing Laurier's attention to the result of plebiscite and asking what he intends to do. November first or second will be the date chosen. The deputation will be representative and it is intended to emphasize the importance of the majority of a hundred thousand votes given for prohibition in English provinces. A deputation from Quebec will ask Government to appoint a commission to investigate charges of election frauds in that province.

CITY FIRE FIGHTERS

A great tenement house was burning like tinder wood in one of the poorest quarters of the metropolis. The stairs had gone up in smoke before everybody had left the building, and even the fire escape down the outside of the building was cut off by the hot flames from the lower windows, which had already peeled off a part of it. A young girl of 14 or 15 was frantically shrieking for help in one of the top windows, and a mother was wringing her hands in piteous despair down in the street. The chief called for volunteers to save the girl, and three men came forward on the instant, without hesitation and without awaiting to count their chances for success. This is the custom in such cases, for no one would take the responsibility of ordering a fireman to his possible death. A strong young fellow who had yet to win his spurs was selected for the task, and he disappeared quickly through the doorway of the adjoining building. When next the crowd saw him he appeared at the window just under the roof, and grasping the tin cornice of the burning building next to him, he swung out into the air and made his way, hand over hand, for 30 feet through the dense smoke that rose in black clouds from the lower windows to the sill where the girl was seen. She had fallen back into the room unconscious and was overcome with smoke by the time he reached her. A thousand anxious faces in the street below were tortured with fear for the hero, a hundred muttered prayers went up for his safety as the fireman disappeared into the black cloud, and a thousand throats sent up a lusty shout of relief as he appeared again at the window a moment later with the limp form of the girl in his arms.—Harper's Round Table.

Rebellion in China.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—China is in the throes of a monster rebellion, which is being managed by shrewd agents in America and Europe on the same plan that the Cuban junta found to work so well. This rebellion has for its object the overthrow of the Chinese Government, which, by the way, is not Chinese at all, but Manchoorian, and as such is disliked and feared by all the Mongolians. The government troops, it is reported, have been defeated in two pitched battles during the last ten days by the Kwangsi rebels, losing 3000 men. Hong Kong despatches state that the revolutionary societies in China, which are practically affiliated under one head, are most active in their efforts to profit by the existing complications in the Orient. Their main object is to strike a decisive blow at the Manchoorian dynasty before either England or Russia has succeeded in obtaining supremacy at Peking. With this end in view the societies have recently met in extraordinary conventions in the principal Chinese cities and have dispatched agents to their European and American branches to rush the plan of action to a speedy consummation.

HALLOWELL, Me., Oct. 19.—Several members of the First Maine Artillery came to Hallowell on Tuesday night to celebrate pay day, and after the performance by the Burglar company made things lively. One policeman lost a tooth and many received black eyes and bruises. Several soldiers were gathered in by the police, and three were tried in the municipal court this morning. Harry Pierce, of Battery D, went to jail for thirty days. Nicholas McKenney, of the same battery, received sixty days for assault and battery and drunkenness, and John Cook of the same battery paid \$18.25 for his fun.

Novelists and playwrights in sample quantities are the latest class to come under the basilisk eye and measuring tape of The Tailor and Cutter. FAIR PLAY.

Apples in England.

TORONTO, Oct. 19.—The Telegram's special cable from London says: Canadian apples offered for sale at Covent Garden today were, upon being opened, found to be in bad condition. Many of them were spotted and partially blighted. The prices in consequence were poor. Nova Scotia apples were in fine condition. Kings bring from 17 to 21 shillings, pippins 23 to 30 shillings a barrel. The best Blenheims brought from 18 to 20 shillings and gravensteins ranged between 12 and 17 shillings.

Winter in the West.

HURON, S. D., Oct. 19.—The snow storm which has raged the past 24 hours, covers most of the state east of the Missouri River, and seems now to have fallen in the Black Hills region. A rain three to five inches is reported in the eastern and southern portions of the state and those figures are exceeded two to four inches in central districts. Telegraph wires are down or working badly and communication is difficult. Railroading is not interrupted. The temperature is forty degrees above zero. A forty mile an hour wind is blowing from the north.

Kaiser in Constantinople.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 19.—The emperor and empress were heartily cheered while driving to the German school yesterday. Their majesties engaged in long conversations with the teachers and children and made minute investigations as to the progress made by the school. Emperor William remarked that there were a large number of foreign children in attendance at the school and he said this demonstrated the victorious force of Germany. A number of songs, including the Turkish hymn were sung. The emperor drove through the streets proceeded and followed by the squadrons of cavalry and accompanied by a number of others. The houses of all the German residents were festooned with evergreens and decorated with German-Turkish flags. At a gala dinner given at the Yildiz Kiosk yesterday evening, 12 courses were laid. The local newspaper publish sympathetic articles on the visit of the emperor and empress of Germany to Turkey, and assert that it will further commemorate the friendly attitude of Germany and Turkey.

Britain's Alleged Stand.

LONDON, Oct. 19.—A despatch to a London news agency from Shanghai says:—Reports from Japanese sources are in circulation here to the effect that Sir Claude MacDonald, British Minister at Peking, has informed the Chinese Government that sovereignty appertains solely to the Emperor, who has been forcibly abducted and deposed, and that he must be restored to his position, while Kang-Yu-Wei and the other reformers must be pardoned. Failing compliance, Great Britain will enforce these demands. A rebellion in Hunan Province is certain. Foreigners at Yang-tse ports are in great danger. Most of the residents have left Chung-King, in the Province of Szechuan, and foreigners at other ports are preparing for a hurried departure.
