

Islanders Defeat Moncton Hawks 6 To 1

Whitlock And Nicolle Pace Beavers To 11-4 Win Over St. Mary's

SAINTE JOHN, N. B., Jan. 22.—(CP)—Hitting hardest where it hurt most, rampant Saint John Beavers won their seventh game in their last nine starts tonight by routing Halifax St. Mary's 11-4 in a Maritime Major Hockey League game played at the Forum.

The victory lifted third-place Beavers to within seven points of the runner-up St. Mary's team and represented Saint John's most convincing win of the season over the free-wheeling Halifax team.

Saint John used only seven forwards through most of the game, but they out-played, out-shot and out-scored Halifax all the way.

Buck Whitlock and Nick Nicolle paced Saint John's streamlined attack against the Halifax goal and both figured in eight of the 11 goals, although Nicolle officially was credited with only seven points, two goals and five assists. Whitlock fired three goals and assisted on five others.

Johnny Myketyk was missing from the Halifax lineup while Beavers were short Vic Jackson and Bob Mudge, both out with injuries. McIntyre dressed for the first two periods, was used sparingly and did not appear on the ice in the third. His ailing wrist again forced him out of action.

Roaring from behind a 1-0 lead, set up by Moncton in the first period, Leo Lamoureux's Charlottetown Islanders went high, wide and handsome in the second and third periods last night to slap home six goals and clinch a 6-1 verdict over the cellar dwelling Moncton Hawks in a Maritime Senior Hockey League clash at the Forum here before a small crowd of fans.

Shut out from numerous dangerous scoring attacks by stellar goal tending by Les Colvin, Islanders trailed by one goal in the first period that came off the stick of Moushey Dowling from a scramble in front of the Islanders net, but put on the pressure to net two goals in the second and four in the closing session without a reply from the opposition. Dowling's goal came while Islanders were playing a man short.

The win puts the Islanders back up to a 23-point leadership margin over Halifax Saint Mary's, who took an 11-4 shellacking from Beavers at Saint John last night.

Frankie Bathgate was the leading scorer for Islanders with a brace of tallies, while George McLagan, Walter Pawlyshyn, Hub Beaudry and Mac Beaton chipped up one each to account for the rest of Islanders scoring. Jack Morrow picked up two assists, while Red Favero, Johnny Horeck, Marcel Clements and Beaudry also picked up an assist apiece.

Mac Beaton fired home Islanders sixth and final marker of the night at 15:28 when he teamed up with Beaudry and Clements at centre ice on a slick three-way attack.
