Carter, chief supervisor of the provincial department of municipal affairs, told delegates to the 55th annual convention of the Ontario Municipal Association Monday. Speaking of the Toronto "metropolitan" plan, and its possible adoption elsewhere, Mr. Carter said: "The government of Ontario at the last session of the legislature brought into being a federated form of municipal government in which local councils retain powers and responsibilities of a purely local nature, but which gives to a central authority the responsibility for area-wide problems of an urbanized nature. "It could very well produce the proper method for the financing and provision of essential community services for urbanized areas not only by being adapted to other parts of Ontario, but elsewhere in countries whose peoples are assured of the democratic way of life which has as necessary component the preservation of local autonomy to a high degree."
