AT THE BUTTS.

Our Boys at Ottawa.

HOW THEY ARE SHOOTING.

OTTAWA, Sept. 6.

To-day has been a brilliant day as regards shooting on Rideau range. It has been a lovely day, with a prevailing wind from the right, at times awkwardly scoring to the left. The whole day has been occupied with the Dominion of Canada match, at 200 and 500 yards with the Snider, and 600 with the Martini Henri, and as it was the final match of the grand aggregate score, increased importance was attached to it. With 96 out of 100 Serge. Rolston took the leading position, closely followed by a 95 of Lt. Wilson. An eager crowd soon surrounded the secretary's tent to learn what scores had come in the grand aggregate, and in time it was known that Mitchell, of Toronto, with 305, and Armstrong, of the Guards of Ottawa, with 298 were the two highest and the winners of the medals. Capt. Hartt, of St. John, is fourth with 295, having lost in a shoot-off for third place, but wins a badge.

Among the Lower Province winners were Capt. Weeks, of town Engineers, and Lt. E. Stewart, G. A., P. E. Island, \$5 each. Early in the morning the London Merchants' Match between teams from each Province will be brought on. The Wimbleton is new, a great many of old reliable shots not coming to the fore.

Nova Scotia News.

HALIFAX, Sept. 6.

Stock is now being subscribed for a third party prohibition organ in Halifax. The Cunard steamers Alpha and Beta have been purchased by a Halifax company, and will run between Halifax, Bermuda and Jamaica. Thus again Canada has the desired steam communication with the West Indies.

Judge Smith has sent his decision in the Shelburne election case to the Prothonotary there.

A well founded rumor says that General Laurie is unseated for corruption practised by agents.

Great Storm on Behring Sea.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 6.

The United States revenue cutter Bear arrived from Behring's Sea this morning, reporting (Aug. 3) while most of the whaling fleet were anchored between Cape Smythe and Point Barrow, a furious storm occurred and the following vessels were wrecked: Barks Mary & Susan, Young Phoenix, and Fleetwing, and schooners Jane Gray and Ino. The crews of the last vessels, numbering 109, were rescued by the Bear and brought to this city.

Outrage on the High Sea.

LONDON, Sept. 6.

The British barque Gylfe, Capt. Irwin, which sailed from Quebec July 3rd for Greenock, and a portion of whose crew arrived in New York some days ago on the steamer Persian Monarch, and charged the Captain with attempting to scuttle the vessel, arrived at Queenstown to-day, with Captain and First and Second Mates on board, all in an exhausted condition. The Captain reports that the crew mutinied Aug. 21, took to the boats, abandoning the vessel. The Gylfe is waterlogged and will be towed to Greenock.

Destructive Cyclone.

HAVANA, Sept. 6.

A terribly destructive cyclone visited the island on Tuesday. The gunboat Lealtad, lying at Batabanfo foundered in the storm, and nine of her crew, including the commander, were drowned.

Advices from Sagua are that fifty persons lost their lives there, while the damage to dwellings and warehouses in the city, vessels in the harbor and wharves is very great.

The village of Pueblo Nuevo in the neighborhood of Sagua is literally wiped out. Telegraph wires are badly broken.

Yellow Fever.

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 6.

The number of new cases for the 24 hours ending at 6 o'clock this evening is 46, and the deaths ten. The gloomiest apprehensions are felt.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6.

Mayor Hewitt issued an appeal to the public to-day for aid for the yellow fever sufferers at Jacksonville, Florida. He says he will forward the subscriptions he receives daily to Florida.

Treaty with the United States.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 6.

There are still hopes of the ratification of the Treaty with the United States. The discussion of the Treaty causes much excitement. At Canton a mob attacked the residence of an American official.

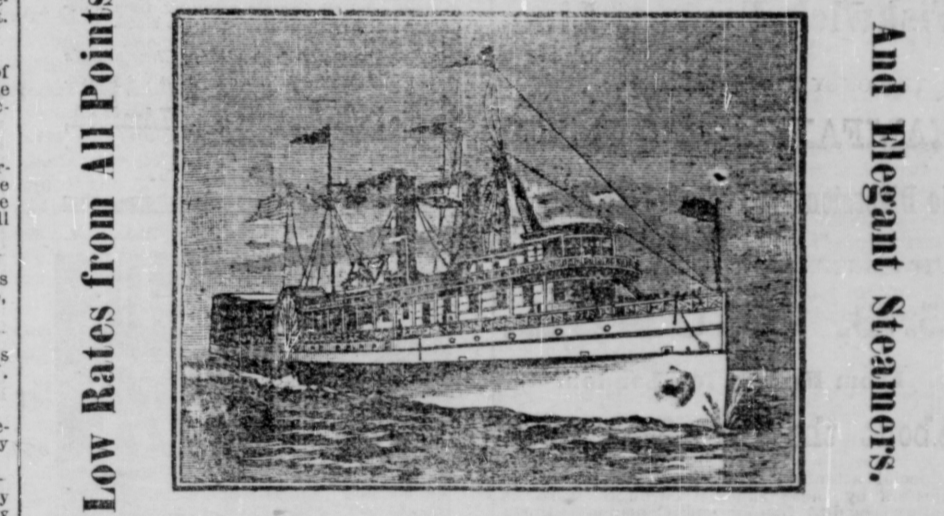
