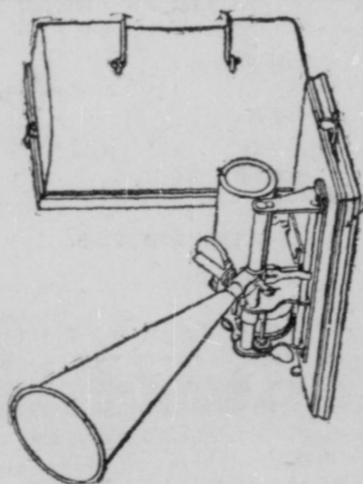

CATHOLIC LITERARY INSTITUTE.—The annual sale of magazines and newspapers at the Catholic Literary Institute last evening was conducted by Mr. E. H. Norton. The sale was very interesting, and some excellent literature was disposed of.

A MILD FALL.—With the exception of some lolly in the docks there is no indication of the formation of ice about the harbor. The steamers are running regularly between the Island and the mainland, and three coal laden schooners arrived yesterday. And Christmas will be upon us in less than a week!

DIED FROM HIS INJURIES.—We hear with regret that Mr. Charles Taper, who met with so serious an accident at his home in Winsloe a few days ago, died at the Prince Edward Island Hospital this morning. Mr. Taper was a son-in-law of Mr. F. H. Horne, and leaves a widow and five children, who have the sympathy of all.

LARGE MARKET.—There was a large attendance at the market today and sales were lively. There was an abundance of turkeys, geese and fowl on sale. Turkeys brought from 8 to 9c. a pound, geese from 60 to 90c., and fowl from 40 to 50c. The market will be open again on Friday and Saturday of this week, and on the same days next week.

BURNED TO DEATH.—The seven year old daughter of a man named Boutillier, living at Bedford, N. S., was fatally burned a few days ago. It seems that the child was putting some shavings into the stove at her home, when they ignited, setting fire to her apron. The little one's clothing was soon all ablaze, and before the fire could be extinguished she was so badly burned that she died in a few hours.

A. C. A. C.—The Abegweit-Crescent club's new rooms in the Macdonald building, Queen St. which for some time have been undergoing repair, are now ready and will be moved into tomorrow night. The rooms present a pleasing appearance and are well lighted. The walls have been painted a nice blue. The large apartment in the rear will be fitted up as a recreation room, containing the billiard and pool tables. Of the two rooms in the front of the building the right will be used as a parlor and the left as a reading room. The rooms will be lighted by electricity.
