Further Advance of the British.

FINE FIGHTING BY THE GOORKHAS.

Heavy Punishment Inflicted on Tribes.

THIRTY NATIVE VILLAGES BURNED.

SIMLA, Dec. 4.—Further despatches from the front say that the Kuron column of the punitive force of British troops, which met with a fierce resistance on its march into the Cabukanni country, where thirty villages of insurgents were burned, has continued its advance and inflicted heavy punishment on them. They had an almost inaccessible position on heights which was stormed in fine style by the Goorkhas who captured the position at the point of the bayonet. Many tribesmen were killed.

Of the British force Major Sittack and two men were wounded and two privates killed. The Maharajah, Sir Poalate Singh, was shot in the hand during the fight.

Manitoba School Question Again.

LAURIER AND TARTE INTRIGUING

To "Rope in" Sir Adolph Chapleau.

OTTAWA, Dec. 4.—Official notice of a three cent postage rate to the United Kingdom and other British possessions was given yesterday. The rate goes into effect on the 1st of January next.

Lieut. Governor Patterson, Mr. Tarte and Chevalier Drolet left here for Quebec yesterday to see governor Chapleau. It is reported here that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has "roped in" Patterson to influence Sir Adolph Chapleau whose time as governor is nearly up, to go on a royal commission to investigate the Manitoba School Question.

The non-acceptance by Catholics of the Laurier-Greenway settlement has caused a great disappointment to the government, and it is said here that the Pope has been induced to withhold his Encyclical based on Mgr. Merry del Val's report on an assurance that the Canadian Government will do something more.

Heavy Snowstorm.

SIoux CITY, Iowa, Dec. 4.—The worst snowstorm in years has been raging here for forty-eight hours and railway traffic is seriously hampered.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Dec. 2.—A three cornered duel took place at a country church near Huntsville, Madison county last night. Seth Lowe, Will Phillips and John Howard, three farmers, were in love with the same girl, Miss Irene Pruitt. Miss Pruitt went to prayer meeting last night with Phillips, and there they met the other men. The girl went into the building while the men repaired a short distance away to discuss the situation. Howard and Lowe jumped upon Phillips, who pulled a revolver and shot Howard through the body. Lowe then set a bullet through Phillips' back, Phillips shot Lowe from the ground, however, wounding him dangerously in the left shoulder. The fight created a panic in the church. It is said all three men are fatally injured.

BERLIN, December 2.—Prince Bismarck, in the Hamburg Nachrichten, commenting upon the alleged intentions of the United States to interfere in the Hayti matter, says: "We deem it a political necessity to oppose this American arrogance often and emphatically, and certainly when directed against Germany. Of course nobody in Germany dreams of annexing Hayti but we hope to induce the government to energetically demand the necessary satisfaction in the shape of damages, and to enforce this by proper means."

ST. JOHN'S, Que., Dec. 2.—Another murder is reported from Sabrequis, down the Richelieu river six miles. A man named Whalen is alleged to have killed a French woman named Rosa Gauthier. Detectives have gone from Montreal.

RICHMOND, Va., Dec. 2.—A bill was today introduced in the senate to abolish football where an admission fee is charged.

MONTREAL, Dec. 2.—Charles F. Portier, postmaster at St. Cuneonde, has been missing since Monday. It is thought that he has gone to the States. The post office authorities have instituted an investigation and find that he is short some \$359 in the sale of stamps. It is thought this is not his only reason for departure.

FORT WAYNE, Ind., December 3.—A special train of four cars was run at an unprecedented rate of speed, between Pittsburgh and Chicago, over the Pennsylvania road, for the purpose of ascertaining the possibility of reducing the time of the limited express to 20 hours between New York and Chicago. The train left Pittsburgh at 6.58 a. m., and arrived at Chicago at 5 o'clock, making the 468 miles in 692 minutes. The same train left Chicago at 9 a. m., reaching Pittsburgh at 6.25 p. m., making the eastward run 37 minutes quicker than the westward run, which breaks all previous records.

WARSAW, Ind., Dec. 2.—Five robbers entered Miles & Higbee's bank, at Milford, early today. They bound and gagged the night watchman. Dr. Black who was passing on his way home, was also seized and gagged. The robbers then drilled a hole in the safe and seven charges of dynamite were exploded, but they only disfigured the safe without opening it.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—A special to the Press from Matteawan, N. Y., says the gold craze in Fishkill, created by the discovery of a large nugget of gold in the mountains east of that village, is still unabated. Gold seekers are seen wending their way up the mountain with pickaxe and shovel daily, with hopes of finding more of the precious metal. It is reported that another nugget of metal, supposed to be composed of gold and silver, was found on the south side of the Fishkill mountains and that the metal will be taken to New York to be assayed.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Peru is the first of the South American countries to open negotiations with the United States for a reciprocity treaty under the provisions of the Dingley law. Peru has submitted a schedule of the articles on which it desires reciprocity concessions. These embrace brandies and wines, heads of cattle and goats, stains, sugar and wool, cotton and woolen goods, Peruvian bark, rubber and many native products, which it is said had not come into competition with American products. It is expected that Mr. Kasson will prepare a schedule covering the goods which this country desires to export to Peru, and that between those two schedules, a list will be made for insertion in a reciprocity treaty.
