Screech of Siren Scares Wild Duck

OTTAWA, Sept. 4 — (CP) — The screech of a two-ton monster siren is scaring the ducks out of the prairie wild duck, just as the scientists predicted.

The Resources Department jubilantly announced today that with the use of the powerful siren it may have finally found a way of halting damage to western grain fields by migrating waterfowl.

Federal scientists, conducting experiments in the Kindsersy area of Saskatchewan, have erected the huge siren on the back of a three-ton truck.

Powered by a 180-horsepower motor, the siren produces a high continuous screech — about middle "C" on the piano — that can be heard within a four-mile radius. The noise is so intense that siren operators must plug their ears.

The ducks don't like it one bit. "They were not only frightened," said the department, "but continued to be so uneasy that they would not feed although they had been without food for two or three days."

S'side Man To Retire From C.N.R. After Nearly Half-Century Of Service

After forty four years of faithful service with the railway on Prince Edward Island, Mr. James P. Hogan, Canadian National Railway agent at Summerside will retire on September 30th. His many friends here and in other parts of the province join in extending to Mr. Hogan congratulations for a job well done for almost half a century. He joined the service on September 22, 1908 at Charlottetown under the late G. A. Sharpe who was at that time superintendent of the railway.

In those days the system was known as the Prince Edward Island railway with head office at Moncton. His first relief work was at Cape Traverse and for the next three years he served at various stations throughout the province. In 1911 he was transferred to Summerside and served under Mr. J. D. Eunan who was then the agent here. Promotion for efficient service came rapidly and in 1934 he assumed charge of Summerside office upon retirement of Mr. J. M. Nicholson. During those years Mr. Hogan served under six separate superintendents and saw many changes during that time, changes which marked the gradual improvement in service to the public, the change over from the old narrow gauge to the standard gauge and the dieselization of the system in this province, the first in the Dominion to be entirely serviced by these modern engines.

Mr. Hogan, in commenting on the greatly increased business at the Summerside station, estimated that since 1939 to the present day the traffic had increased at least three times over the 1939 earnings.

Mr. Hogan paid tribute to the various superintendents who were in charge of the railway system in this province and said that Mr. Montgomery, the present superintendent, was a man held in the highest esteem by all who served under him, that he is an A-1 railway man and one who at all times endeavored to assist the men under his charge and that he had every confidence in Mr. Montgomery as a superior officer.

Few citizens in Summerside are better known or held in higher esteem than Mr. Hogan and the best wishes of all his friends for a long and pleasant retirement are extended.
