

### New Canadian Cardinal May Be Appointed

QUEBEC, Nov. 12 (CP)—People close to Quebec ecclesiastical circles believe Archbishop Maurice Roy of Quebec will be one of the new Cardinals appointed at a Vatican consistory announced for Dec. 10.

North America's oldest see in this predominantly Roman Catholic capital of French Canada has been headed by a Cardinal almost regularly for more than 50 years. Quebecers feel it is a virtual certainty that a cardinal will be appointed here.

Msr. Roy, whose appointment in July, 1947, at the age of 42 made him the youngest Archbishop in Quebec's history, may become Quebec's youngest cardinal as well, it is felt.

The tall, dark-haired prelate who will be 47 next Jan. 26, would be Quebec's fifth cardinal.

#### Only Canadian Cardinal

Since the death of Rodrigue Cardinal Villeneuve of Quebec in 1947, James Cardinal McGuigan of Toronto has been the only Roman Catholic prelate holding that rank in Canada.

Pope Pius has not called a consistory since 1946 and it has been more than four years now that Quebec City's Roman Catholic leader has held his office without

### Think China May Try To Escape Russian Yoke

In these four years the Church administration in Quebec has undergone major re-organization. This has led to widespread speculation as to which of Quebec's five archbishops would be appointed cardinals. The Ottawa see is part of Quebec's ecclesiastical province.

While Quebecers believe the church will continue in the tradition and appoint a cardinal for Quebec City, there is talk that Archbishop Paul-Emile Leger of Montreal will receive the red hat. Archbishop Alexandre Vachon of Ottawa has also been mentioned as a possible choice.

Often, when the names of Msr. Leger and Msr. Vachon are mentioned as possible Cardinals, it is to support talk that Archbishop Roy may be transferred to a high post in Rome and succeeded here by the Ottawa or Montreal Archbishop.

Another possibility mentioned is that no switches of seats will be made but that the Vatican will appoint a cardinal either in Montreal or Ottawa, as well as in Quebec.

(Reports coming out of Communist China since the Red regime took over have given a varied, and often conflicting picture of what is happening inside that country. These reports come from a variety of sources, among them travellers. Several of these travellers have recently reached London, and in the following story give a summary of their observations. Their names cannot be disclosed.)

LONDON, Nov. 11 — (Reuters) — Communist China is a full-fledged Soviet satellite today, but given certain favorable circumstances she will probably make an attempt to shake off the Russian yoke, according to reports brought by travellers arriving here from the Far East.

This, according to these re-

ports, is the belief held by a growing number of Chinese in Shanghai, especially the non-political intelligentsia and business classes.

The travellers say these groups believe New China will attempt to break her tie, preferably in a friendly fashion, with her dominating "big brother" and pursue an independent policy.

Belief in such a development is claimed by its proponents to be based on "hard" facts.

Foremost among these is the alleged growing dissatisfaction among high "native" Communists, whose basic policy is China for the Chinese and non-dependence on any foreign power. They are reported displeased with the manner in which the Sino-Soviet link-up has worked to the detriment of the Chinese nation and people.

These "native" Communists, headed by party chairman Mao Tze-Tung and including such figures as the Prime Minister and Foreign Minister, Chou-En-Lai, and the army commander-in-chief, Chu Teh, have been playing second fiddle to the so-called "international" Communists since the signature of the Sino-Soviet treaty. But public support has recently tended to harden in their favor.

The "internationals" are headed by Liu Shao-Chi, one of the six vice-chairmen of the people's government but widely recognized as the "strong man" of Red China, and Li Li-San, the Moscow-trained labor minister.

Travellers declare that a major factor responsible for the swing in public sentiment has been the Chinese intervention in the Korean war, with its attendant heavy losses in men and material and adverse effect on the nation's internal economy.

The Chinese Communist chairman, it is said, is not unduly worried about the presence of the thousands of Russian advisers in this country. He is reported to be confident that he can get rid of them when zero hour strikes.

The Chinese "international" Communists, however, present a more formidable problem, and some Chinese think that nothing short of an armed revolution can shake them from their pedestal in the councils of the nation.

The travellers conclude with the statement that, according to conservative estimates, there is in Shanghai alone today one policeman to every 20 residents, in addition to an army of political commissars to direct indoctrination of the population and thousands of informers to spy on suspect "counter-revolutionaries."

### No New Automobile Models Next Year

OTTAWA, Nov. 12—(CP)—Production Minister Howe said recently that an order freezing new passenger-car models in the United States to conserve machine tools will apply automatically to Canada.

He was commenting on an order in Washington by the National Production Authority to divert all new machine tools to defence and defence-supporting industries after Feb. 1 next.

Other defence-production officials said the U. S. diversion order will mean that all Canadian passenger cars and civilian trucks will be frozen on 1952 patterns. U. S. frames and body stampings for Canadian vehicles are in the hands of manufacturers and 1952 models are being turned out. Similar action to freeze patterns to conserve the machine-tool supply was taken early in the Second World War.

The U. S. order applies to machine tools used in the production of automobiles and such other durable goods as washing machines and refrigerators.

However, officials said the patterns normally do not change markedly on these items and the industries likely would not be greatly affected.

### 38 Candidates Now In Field In Newfoundland

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 12 — (CP) — Campaigning for the Nov. 26 Newfoundland surprise election is expected to pick up this week with a total of 38 candidates already in the field.

Liberals under Premier Joseph Smallwood have named 26 candidates and probably will name two more for the remaining seats.

Progressive Conservatives, who formed the opposition in the last House, have nine standard-bearers in the field and three independents have also entered the fight.

Standing at dissolution, which came two days after Mr. Smallwood's unexpected announcement Nov. 1, was: Liberals 20, Progressive Conservatives five, Independent two, vacant one.

OTTAWA, Nov. 12—(CP)—George McIlraith, parliamentary assistant to Trade Minister Howe, said today an investigation has shown that there was nothing to substantiate charges that the 1961 census in Quebec City was inadequate.
