HALIFAX (CP) - The weather office says an intensifying storm was headed toward the area from the Eastern States. All three provinces will get an appreciable amount of rain from this system which is expected to pass through the district and into Labrador by late this evening.

Regional forecasts: Northern Nova Scotia, Eastern Shore, Prince Edward Island, Eastern New Brunswick Counties: Overcast with rain becoming cloudy with a few showers this evening; little change in temperature; winds southeasterly 15, increasing this morning to southerly 25 with gusts to 45, shifting this evening to north-west 20. Low-high at New Glasgow and Goshen 42 and 58, Charlottetown 40 and 53, Moncton 42 and 50. Outlook for Friday, mostly cloudy and cooler.

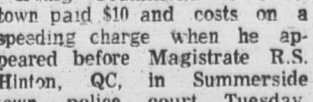

## Association Announces

### SDU Girl's Scholarships

The annual meeting of the Catholic Girls' Scholarships Association held at St. Dunstan's University approved 56 scholarships for Island catholic girls attending St. Dunstan's. This is the largest number of scholarships ever granted by the Association but it would have been greater still if the University had not greatly increased the number of its scholarships and bursaries. In only three years the number of girls at St. Dunstan's has more than doubled, going from 100 to 220.

Mrs. B. W. DesRoches, Missouche was re-elected president. Mrs. Emmett MacDonald, Morell, was elected vice-president; and Mrs. John A. MacDonald, Charlottetown, secretary-treasurer.

**EVERY LEVEL** Mrs. DesRoches expressed the appreciation and thanks of the association to the Catholic Women's League, the parishes, and other donors who made last year's program a success. The meeting discussed the need for better education at every level on Prince Edward Island and especially the need for the higher education of girls. Discussion indicated there was a real need to continue financial help. The government loan is a big help but imposes such a heavy burden that some girls quit college rather than carry it. In view of this it was decided it was necessary to continue offering scholarships until the government offered grants or scholarships to replace the loans.
