Keep it Before the People.

And any further deficiency which may arise from insufficient quality of land among the said portion of railway to complete the said twenty-five million acres, or from the prevalence of lakes and water stretches in the sections granted, which lakes and water stretches shall not be computed in the acreage of such sections, shall be made up from other portions to be selected by the company in the tract known as the "fertile belt," that is to say, the land lying between parallels 49 and 57 degrees of north latitude, or elsewhere, at the option of the company, by the grant thereof of similar alternate sections extending back twenty-four miles deep on each side of any branch line or lines of railway to be located by the company, and to be shown on a map or plan thereof deposited with the Minister of Railways, or of any common front line or lines agreed upon between the Government and the company—the conditions hereinafter stated as to lands not fairly fit for settlement to be applicable to such additional grants.
