PERFECT BUTTER FOR BRITISH CONSUMERS.

In answer to a question lately asked him as to whether Canadian butter in Great Britain is making a good market for itself, Professor Robertson said: "Excellent; in some cases at prices over the Australian and next to the Danish." The Professor went on to say: "There is a good deal said about the great increase in the exports of butter from Victoria. That colony arranged to give a bonus for five years, beginning in 1889 and ending in 1894. In 1894 the British Trade returns give the imports from Victoria at \$4,565,425. Since that time Canada has gained one and a quarter million of dollars, and Victoria has lost over three-quarters of a million of dollars."

"In order to have creamery butter in a perfect state when it is delivered to the consumers in Great Britain, it should be protected in cold storage from one day after it is made. As the Government had decided to arrange for what will be practically a chain of cold storage service from the producers in Canada to the consumers in Great Britain, it was necessary that the owners of the creameries, the manufacturers of butter and the farmers who furnish the milk and cream should all co-operate to bring about the best results. Very few creameries were until this season equipped with sufficient or efficient cold storage accommodation."

Their Minister of Finance once asserted that his fellow-citizens spent every year £24,000,000 upon excursions to Europe—which meant a total loss of that sum to American trade. This is the penalty they have to pay for allowing the struggle for material progress to blind them to the intellectual needs of a nation.

An Athens correspondent asserts that Prince Constantine, after the retreat from Domokos, attempted to commit suicide with a revolver on learning of the intense feeling against him. The correspondent adds that the Prince was prevented by his officers from taking his life.

Up in Kingston a postmaster was dismissed the other day. The reason given is that he is that he is too old. He is 68 years of age. A man named Gunn is appointed to the place. This juvenile Grit is 69 years of age.

RUSSENIAX PEASANTS.

They Attracted Attention in Montreal.—The Men are a Race of Giants.

There be strange and weird peoples who arrive at Windsor Station these days, on their way to the unsettled tracts of Canada's Northwest. Last week there were, besides the usual motley crowd of ordinary immigrants, two lots of Galicians, whose sheepskin clothing and general barbaric aspect attracted a good deal of curious attention. Yesterday there was the most peculiar aggregation of all, in the persons of forty-four Russeniak peasants, the first of their kind who ever came to this country.

The Russeniaks were dressed in their national costumes. It is a costume that is not likely to attain any great popularity in this country, but it probably has its points of excellence. The men wore light-fitting trousers of coarse white homespun linen, which they tucked into high rawhide boots, the tops of which were turned down in a loose flap and were elaborately embroidered. The shirts were of the same material, and the coats were of sheep skin, with the hair inside, laced in front with rawhide lugs. The hat was straw and brimmed, with a bunch of cock's feathers stuck in the left side. Each man wore a wide leather belt, embroidered in geometrical designs, from which hung three or four pouches of untanned leather, containing food, tobacco, water, or anything else according to the desire of the owner. A long sheath knife was also hung from the belt.

The women were dressed somewhat differently. They wore sheepskin coats just like the men, but their only other garment was one of linen, with embroidered edges, which reached to about half way below the knee. The legs were entirely bare and on their feet were heavy rawhide shoes. Their head-dresses were of white linen, with a long veil flowing over the shoulders. The children were for the most part bare-footed, and they wore only a single sleeveless garment of white linen, which looked a good deal like a night shirt.

Both men and women were, as a rule, remarkably handsome. The men were clean shaven, except for long and carefully curled moustaches. Their height was a striking characteristic, none being under six feet and quite a number almost seven feet.

The Russeniaks are the inhabitants of the semi-independent Duchy of Bukovina, of which the Emperor of Austria is the hereditary Archduke. The duchy lies on the extreme southeastern corner of the Austrian Empire, bordering on Russia, Roumania, Galicia and Moldavia. The language of the people is a Slav dialect, which is almost identical with Little Russian. Their religion is a form of Roman Catholicism.

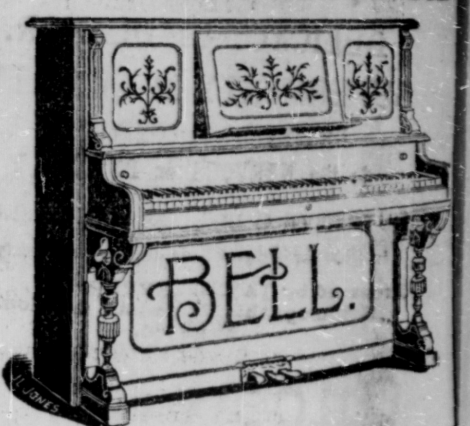
