

Mayhew Says Basic Split In Anglo-American Policy

LONDON (CP) — Christopher Mayhew, who quit as Britain's navy minister, maintains there is a basic Anglo-American split on strategy towards China and expresses fear Britain's declining military strength may force her to rely too heavily on United States policy and power.

While the 50-year-old Mayhew is reported to have stepped down because Prime Minister Wilson rejected the Royal Navy's plea for new carriers, Mayhew's weekend statements suggested the issue centres mainly on the question of Britain's future military independence.

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a peacekeeping role east of the Suez on the proposed curtailed defence budget of \$2,000,000,000 (\$6,000,000,000) a year, "we should be able to act only with the consent and support of the vastly more powerful Americans, in the role of auxiliaries rather than allies," he said in a statement Saturday.

"This degree of dependence on the Americans would be undesirable even if there were close political agreement between us in the area. But in the Far East—unlike Europe—this agreement, particularly in relation to China, does not exist."

Mayhew argued, in advance of the governments while paper on defence to be issued Tuesday, that if the administration wants to maintain a world role, it should be prepared to pay the price in the form of American F-111A strike aircraft and new carriers. This would mean heavier outlays.

But Mayhew did not insist the government follow this policy. He suggested an alternative—a phased disengagement east of Suez—arguing that it is doubtful in any case that any while country can carry out an effective peacekeeping role east of Suez in the 1970s because of strong national racial feeling there.

"In particular, we should not commit ourselves to the containment of China on this narrow basis," he said. "Western military power can do little to ensure political containment, while the military containment of China in alliance with the U.S. has very grave implications and calls for much wider public discussion than it has had."

Mayhew's emphasis on China indicated there is more to the

CONTRACT BRIDGE

The bidding:

Let's say you have the West hand and the opponents arrive at six spades on the bidding shown. It is your lead and the question is whether you should commence firing with the jack of hearts or jack of diamonds. It so happens that the suits are exactly equal, and, offhand, the choice appears to be an absolute toss-up. However, just as in most so-called toss-up situations, there is an inference to be drawn from the bidding which should persuade you to lead a diamond rather than a heart.

Note that if you lead a diamond the contract goes down, while if you lead a heart, de-

labor governments internal policy struggle than the question of military equipment. When Mayhew described the governments defence policy as dangerously mistaken, he not only was arguing that the government was trying to do too much with too little, but losing its power to act independently of the U.S.

However, the speed with which Mayhew's deputy, J.P. W. Mallalieu, agreed to step in as the new navy minister suggested the defence policy is not as critical as some British newspapers describe it. Otherwise Mallalieu, a former Fleet Street journalist with 21 tumultuous and outspoken years in politics, would also have resigned.

One other possibility is that Sir David Luce, 60-year-old First Sea Lord and chief of naval staff, may also step down in protest against the government's reported plans to allow the carrier fleet to die through attrition and to rely on Polaris submarines as the navy's strategic striking force.

However, Sir David kept silent Sunday amid reports he may make his decision Tuesday when the white paper is published. Sunday editorial reaction generally acclaimed Mayhew as a man of honor and conscience, deeply dedicated to the support of his department. But Mayhew was not a member of the cabinet where military issues are handled by Defence Secretary Denis Healey.

And since Mayhew's views seemed to coincide with the Conservative party's official view Britain ought to pull in its defence horns and cut costs, the Labor administration likely will be able to ride out the minor storm the resignation caused. It appeared unlikely in the present state, the issue could cause Wilson to postpone reported plans to hold a string general election.

Space Scientist Takes Own Life

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A brilliant young space scientist, chosen by the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce as one of 1965's 10 outstanding young men, is dead, a suicide, police reported.

Donald D. Williams, 34, a scientist with the communications satellite laboratory of the Hughes Aircraft Co., shot himself in the head Monday night while standing in the bathtub at his apartment, police said. Williams, a native of Santa Monica, Calif., was undergoing psychiatric treatment, but failed to keep an appointment with his psychiatrist Monday.

Uganda Gov't Seized By PM

KAMPALA (AP) — Prime Minister Milton Obote announced he has assumed "all the powers of the government of Uganda" and arrested five members of his cabinet. He said from now on he will rule with advice from a council "whose members I shall name later."

The prime minister, 48, said he acted independently and for "the wishes of the people of this country for peace, order and prosperity."

\$720,000 FOR INDIA

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican announced Friday that contributions to Pope Paul's fund-raising campaign for food for India now total 450,652,474 lire (\$720,000). The largest single contribution, \$160,000, came from an anonymous donor.

Pancake Race Title Is Won By Suburban Ottawa Woman

OTTAWA (CP) — A frozen pancake clanging in her frypan, a suburban Ottawa woman flashed to an international pancake-racing championship Tuesday night.

Clara Baker, 33, a computer systems programmer, scored Canada's first victory in the annual Shrove Tuesday race between Bell's Corners, Ont., and the British village of Buckingham.

In bone-chilling 20 degree winds, she streaked over the 415-yard course in one minute and two seconds, to best her English rival 19-year-old Sally Chittenden, who covered a corresponding course in one minute, 8.7 seconds.

Soon after the 415-yard race was over in Buckingham, borough clerk Anthony Archdeacon put in a transatlantic telephone call to Bell's Corners to transmit the official time, which, he concluded, was a bit

slower than Buckingham's 1:06 last year. During the Buckingham race in this community 50 miles northwest of London, contestants, with frying pans in hand, tossed their pancakes at least three times before the finish line at the wheat house. Almost one-half the community's residents lined the streets to cheer their favorite entry.

Asked whether the girls actually had eatable pancakes in their frying pans, Archdeacon replied: "Well, they had something in them."
