WILL THEY REMAIN SILENT?

One of the questions occupying the public mind, just now, is this: Did the members of the Provincial Alliance, the leaders of the temperance movement in this Province, formulate the Provincial Prohibitory bill as it was submitted to the Legislature and passed? If so, it is passing strange that the time at which the act is to go into operation was postponed until the middle of next year and that no provision was made against the sale and consumption of liquor at the clubs. We understood the President of the Alliance to imply, in his letters to The Guardian or The Patriot, that a law somewhat more stringent than the Canada Temperance Act was demanded. But the law, as passed, is a distinctly weaker measure in every respect,—except that of the fines. Are we to understand that the Provincial Alliance and the whole body of temperance men and women throughout this Province are satisfied with the law, as passed. If the Guardian expresses their feelings and opinions they are satisfied. But we should be sorry to conclude that they are so insincere in the cause of temperance reform as their satisfaction with the maimed and impotent act that has been passed would imply and unless they express their satisfaction by their continued silence we shall refuse to do so. A statement in explanation of the opinions of our temperance leaders is certainly due themselves and those whom they represent. What has the President of the Alliance—Mr. Anderson—to say about this matter? Is he a party to the law as enacted? What have the Grand Worthy Patriarchs of our divisions, and the Grand Masters of our temperance lodges to say about it? Are we to understand that they acquiesce in the legal sale and drinking of alcoholic liquors at all the clubs in Charlottetown, or that they approve of taking the "blood money" throughout the whole of the current year.

THE DAIRY BULLETIN.

We note with much satisfaction that the P. E. Island Dairy Association has decided to issue a monthly bulletin to be distributed free of charge to every patron of cheese and butter factories in the Province. The good that will ensue from a monthly reminder to patrons as to the care to be taken of cattle, the proper methods of attending to the dairy, etc., as well as the valuable hints that will be furnished apropos of the dairying industry cannot be overestimated. We look to the bulletin to be made a valuable medium for our dairymen. The Dairy Bulletin will begin with a circulation of 4,000 copies. The first number will be issued in July, and is in press at The Examiner's Job Printing Rooms.

GAS INSPECTION.

Mr. Martin loses no opportunity to further the interests of this province, great and small; and we are pleased to note that he has lately been stirring up the pure minds of the (3) Liberal Ministers who unjustly dismissed Mr. R. K. Brace,—a man who gave his son to fight the battles of his Queen and country,—to the necessity of gas inspection. We quote the following from Hansard:—

"Mr. Martin.—Some time ago I asked the minister about an inspector of gas in Charlottetown who was dismissed with. A return came down from the Department of Inland Revenue, but I have it on good authority that there was correspondence with the Department of Marine and Fisheries, which was not brought down.

"The Minister of Inland Revenue.—My hon. friend alluded to some petitions which I think he said might be in the Department of Marine and Fisheries. I obtained them from that Department, and included them in the return that came from my department. That was all that came from the Department of Marine and Fisheries.

"Mr. Martin.—Those petitions were against the discharge of Mr. Brace. I have information that there was a petition sent to the Department of Marine and Fisheries asking for his discharge.

"The Minister of Marine and Fisheries.—No, nothing of the kind.

"Mr. Martin.—Then, I asked the minister the other day, and he stated that Mr. Brace had been paid up to the time of his discharge.

"The Minister of Inland Revenue.—So I was told by my officers.

"Mr. Martin.—I have a letter here stating that as a matter of fact he was relieved of his labours on the 15th of February, but was paid only up to the 1st of February. I have it also on good authority that a man named Davy, who was supposed to have performed his duties there has not attended to his duties since his appointment, and no one has been sent down to instruct him as to his duties. The minister has told me that he has had reports from Mr. Davy; but the presumption is that these reports were in blank. I would like the minister to give me some idea as to whether Mr. Davy is attending to his duties or not. It is very important that in a large city like Charlottetown the inspection of gas should be properly attended to; but in the first place Mr. Davy has not been very much in the department, and in the next place he has not been instructed how to test the meters.

"The Minister of Inland Revenue.—I remember that I answered every one of the questions which my hon. friend submitted the other day, from the information which I got from the officers of my department.

"Mr. Martin.—As a matter of fact, has any one been sent down to instruct Mr. Davy in the duties of his office there?

"The Minister of Inland Revenue.—I could not tell at this moment. I know our orders were to send some one down. I will make inquiry.

Mr. Martin.—Will the hon. gentleman take a note of that, because there is some anxiety in the city to know whether or not that has been attended to?"

Our "business is business" Government does not appear to advantage in this dialogue. They have been trying to hold the office referred to for one of their wire-pollers. We have no doubt that it is due to Mr. Martin's continuous enquiry that Mr. Miller has been sent here from Halifax to instruct Mr. Davy to the end that the gas used by the citizens shall be inspected.
