Red-Polish Threat Jolts Big Four Meet

WARSAW (Reuters) — Russia and Poland said Wednesday night they will back Communist East Germany in any moves it takes to eliminate "the abnormal situation in West Berlin."

"The standpoints of both sides have been better explained in the face of a number of problems, the existing divergences have been clarified; attempts were made to bring nearer the viewpoints of the sides."

The declaration came in a joint statement signed by Soviet Premier Khrushchev and Polish Communist party chief Wladyslaw Gomulka at the end of the Soviet premier's 10-day visit to Poland.

But, at the same time, it was noted with regret that in view of the stand of the Western powers it had not been possible to attain an understanding on a peace treaty with Germany and normalization of the situation in West Berlin.

The two Communist leaders also warned that the Western stand at the foreign ministers conference on Germany "may lead to a new aggravation of the situation, pregnant with danger to the cause of peace in Europe."

"The standpoint now professed by the Western powers and the German Federal Republic (West Germany) postpones the understanding awaited by all nations and may lead to a new aggravation of the situation pregnant with danger to the cause of peace in Europe."

The prime minister might therefore have in mind a cabinet order - in council proclaiming the Queen's research fund. Legislation finally comes into effect on proclamation by cabinet.

Both sides "maintain that for the declaration added:

"If despite the goodwill of the German Democratic (Communist) Republic and other Socialist countries, liquidation of the abnormal situation in West Berlin is not effected, then Poland and the Soviet Union will support East Germany in the measures which she may recognize as appropriate within the framework of her sovereign rights, to liquidate the abnormal situation in West Berlin."
