Rotary Fellowship Available For Study In Foreign Lands

The Rotary Club of Charlottetown is seeking applications from young men and women to participate in the Rotary Foundation Fellowships, available to university students who may have permanent residence in Prince Edward Island, although attending universities in other provinces of Canada, or elsewhere.

The fellowship provides an opportunity to live and travel for international understanding in any country in which there are Rotary clubs, and gives the student the opportunity of earning advanced degrees in some foreign country while acting as an ambassador of goodwill from this country.

The applicant should have the ability to read, write and speak the language of the country in which he or she chooses to study, should be between 20 and 25 years, inclusive, of age, single, hold a bachelor's degree

Layettes are still being assembled and there is a need for towels, blankets and sewn jackets. These are made up to fit a two-year-old child, using a kimono-type sleeve and using any soft material lined with some flannelette, not necessarily new.

Dr. Lotta Hirschmanova is again on a tour visiting the people aided by USC. In a report received from Greece, she describes how worthwhile this layette project is, and how very welcome these are, in the des-

perately poor conditions in which these people dwell.

All clean and mended clothing, which has at least six months' wear in it, as well as layette items will be gratefully received by the packing committee at the Army Compound, Brighton Road, Charlottetown.

HALIFAX (CP)—The weather office says a new disturbance over southern Ontario is expected to give more snow to the Maritimes today. This disturbance is weakening so that the snow should be generally intermittent with accumulations of two to four inches.

Regional forecasts:
Halifax and vicinity, Eastern Shore, South Shore except Yarmouth County: Freezing rain warning continued; overcast with freezing rain changing to intermittent snow during morning; clearing in the afternoon; milder; light winds increasing by evening to northwest 20. Low-high at Halifax and Liverpool 25 and 30, Goshen 20 and 22.

Yarmouth County, Annapolis Valley: Cloudy; snowflurries becoming widely scattered in afternoon; milder; light winds increasing in the afternoon to northwest 20 with gusts to 30. Low - high at Yarmouth 27 and 30, Kentville 20 and 22.

Northern N.S., Prince Edward Island, Eastern N.B. Counties: Overcast clearing in the evening; intermittent snow ending in afternoon; milder; light winds increasing in the evening to northwest 15. Low - high at New Glasgow 20 and 22, Char-

lotstown 19 and 22, Moncton 19 and 20.

Cape Breton: Overcast; snow milder; east winds 20 with gusts to 25 diminishing in afternoon to light. Low-high at Sydney 22 and 25.

St. John River Valley, Bay of Chaleur: Overcast with intermittent snow clearing in afternoon; some drifting; milder; light winds increasing by evening to northwest 15. Low - high at Fredericton 10 and 20, Saint John 10 and 22, Edmundston and Campbellton 8 and 15.

Island Native Active In Ont.

MONTAGUE — Principal James Dewar, formerly of Montague, of the Iron Bridge, Ont. public school assisted at a flag raising ceremony at the school, officially initiating the Elmer the Safety Elephant campaign in the area.

Ontario provincial police constable, Ray Brooks said much of the credit for organizing the safety campaign should go to Mr. Dewar who has gone all out in promoting safety for children.

Elmer the Safety Elephant campaign organized in Toronto in 1947 by members of the Metropolitan Safety Council. In the initial year of the campaign the accident toll in Toronto dropped by 44 per cent and was reduced another 18 per cent in its second year despite the fact that there were an additional ten per cent of vehicles on the road.

The Iron Bridge school is the first school in the Blind River area to inaugurate the safety program.

N London Laymen Have Bible Study

Mushroom Sauce for Hamburgers
1/4 lb. fresh or canned mushrooms
