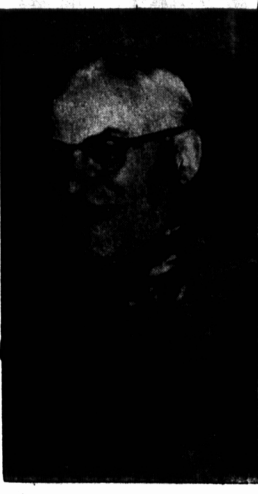
# Had Delightful Visit To His Native Province

# Nov. Traffic At Wood Islands

An analysis of the traffic handled by the Northumberland Ferries on the Wood-Island Caribou service indicates a decrease of 58 passengers, two autos and 76 trucks in the month of November as compared with the corresponding month last year.

The total traffic figures for November 1954 as compared with the same period in 1955 shows an increase of 2,776 in passengers, 512 in autos and 507 in trucks. The figures are, last year in brackets: Passengers 81,798 (79,022) autos 22,236 (21,724) trucks (412 (596)).

The total traffic figures since the service opened in 1941 are: passengers carried 907,963, autos ferried 206,112 trucks 62,759.

**AFL-CIO Merger Will Bring 16-Million Union**

NEW YORK (AP)—Merger of the AFL and CIO became practically an accomplished fact Thursday. The AFL voted its final unanimous approval and the CIO is due to ratify the merger today.

The consolidation brings together unions of the American Federation of Labor and those of the Congress of Industrial Organizations to form a single 16,000,000-member union group.

The new organization will be known formally as the American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organizations (AFL-CIO).

George Meany, onetime New York plumber who heads the AFL and is due to become president of the merged AFL-CIO, pledged in a speech to AFL convention delegates that the new organization would be devoted to improving the lot of workers as a whole.

**NO REASON FOR SPLIT**

Meany said there had been no real reason for unions splitting away from the AFL to found the CIO 20 years ago and now that they will be back together again organized labor could forge ahead to new economic and political gains.

CIO president Walter Reuther told a separate CIO convention, meanwhile, that his organization during its brief history has helped win "a full measure of human dignity for the worker."

Reuther said the merged organization must not rely on power alone but must operate with a "sense of dedication and social responsibility."

The AFL convention's unanimous vote for the merger climaxed a short but spirited debate in which two union leaders complained about some aspects of the merger terms.

Woodruff Randolph, president of the AFL International Typographical Union, claimed the AFL-CIO would have too great powers over jurisdiction, or organizing scope, of the various unions. He also said the merged group should make "a thorough house-cleaning" of racketeer elements as a first order of business.

Meany replied that the new organization would have no greater power than the present AFL. He said some machinery was necessary as a last resort to settle union rivalries or the whole AFL-CIO would fall apart.

The other AFL union president voicing objection to the merger plan was A. Philip Randolph of the sleeping car porters. He wanted greater power to punish unions for practicing racial discrimination.

# Due In Halifax On Army Rotation Scheme

On Monday two hundred and sixty-nine officers and men of the 1st Canadian Infantry Brigade, along with their dependents are due to arrive in Halifax, aboard the Queen Frederica, it was announced yesterday by Army Headquarters. The arrival will mark the concluding phases of the largest rotation scheme ever undertaken by the Canadian Army. One more draft of soldiers and dependents remains to complete the operation.

After arriving home, members of the 1st Brigade will enjoy a period of leave before reporting back to their units across the country. In Germany, members of the 2nd Brigade are getting settled into the initial phases of their tour of duty, with the NATO forces in Europe.

Among the draft which is due to arrive at the east coast late this month, a total of four hundred and fifty-one children will be included. This represents the largest number of children on rotation scheme.

Five Islanders will be among those arriving in Halifax Monday. They are: Lieut. P. R. MacDonald, RCAF, Charlottetown; Sgt. A. S. Clark, RCOE, 5 Bungalow Place, Charlottetown; Spr. W. L. Bevan, RCE, Charlottetown; Pte. W. E. Ballam, RCOE, Summerside and Cfn. J. R. Gallant, RCEME, Summerside. After completing their leave the first four are scheduled to return to their units, and Cfn. Gallant is posted to No. 5 Pers. Depot at Winnipeg, Man.

# Eden Pays Tribute To Canada And Canadians

LONDON (CP)—Prime Minister Eden has paid a glowing tribute to Canada and to her statesmen in a speech Wednesday night at a Canada Club dinner, he said there is no name which conjures up warmer affection in Britain than that of Canada.

"We love Canada, we share a pride in the brilliant flowering of your genius," he told some 500 guests at the Anglo-Canadian gathering. "Your authority as a nation has risen until today when Canada speaks it is with the voice of a leading power."

"Even the other day when Mr. Pearson (External Affairs Minister Pearson) landed back in Canada I see that he was asked what he thought of the speech I had made in Gurnhall about the Middle East and he made the comment: 'If we could all rally behind that we might get somewhere.'"

"Believe me, I was more encouraged by that answer than disturbed by any noises off." The term "noises off," referred to the hostile comments aroused by Sir Anthony's Gurnhall proposals for mediation between Jews and Arabs in the Middle East.

Applause was sustained when Sir Anthony, speaking emphatically, said: "We have not forgotten—and will never forget—at what cost you stood beside us in the darkest days of two world wars, for a long while alone on your continent."

# Poland Buying 9 Million Bushels Low-Grade Wheat

OTTAWA (CP)—Poland is negotiating to complete a 9,350,000 bushel purchase of low-grade Canadian wheat, trade department officials said Wednesday.

However, the Export Credits Insurance Corporation declined to say whether the crown company has insured or will insure more than the 1,850,000 bushels bought by the Poles in July from private traders.

A senior trade department official said that if a deal for 7,500,000 bushels reported in Winnipeg is made on credit "it can be assumed financing will be through the corporation."

Another official said an order-in-council approved in July granted the corporation authority to insure up to 250,000 tons—9,350,000 bushels—of No. 5 grain exported to Poland.

Under a contract concluded in July Poland purchased 50,000 tons of wheat or about 1,850,000 bushels. It paid 15 per cent down and promised to pay the remaining 85 per cent in 12 months.

The corporation insured the 85 per cent of the purchase price. If Poland fails to pay, the corporation will absorb any loss.

Trade officials were aware of the grain trade negotiations with Poland but said announcement of the sale would have to come from the grain trade.

**ASIA ON DISPLAY**

MONTREAL (CP)—A sale of Asiatic handicraft
