Discipline there is recognized, necessary, and while it is restrictive, and to a degree difficult, it perfects and develops. The same is true of the moral law, only its effects are much more profound, touching what is deepest and most excellent in man and perfecting him more fully as man. He is freed from ignorance, from fear and from sin.

Law is not something merely negative. It is not only a stop sign; it also points the right direction. It binds only to free, it limits only to enlarge. We tend to grow intolerant of law and discipline, for they are difficult and irksome. But we should remember that law and freedom are two sides of one coin — a coin which buys happiness.

No one questions the rigid discipline to which athletes subject themselves for their perfection as athletes. Discipline there is recognized, necessary, and while it is restrictive, and to a degree difficult, it perfects and develops. The same is true of the moral law, only its effects are much more profound, touching what is deepest and most excellent in man and perfecting him more fully as man. He is freed from ignorance, from fear and from sin.

Law is not something merely negative. It is not only a stop sign; it also points the right direction. It binds only to free, it limits only to enlarge. We tend to grow intolerant of law and discipline, for they are difficult and irksome. But we should remember that law and freedom are two sides of one coin — a coin which buys happiness.
