

Fuel Injector Systems Next Big Change In Cars

DETROIT (AP) — Introduction of fuel injector systems will be the next major engineering advance in passenger automobiles. But the systems still are far from general application. They still are somewhat expensive. Some still are undergoing study and engineering changes.

Fuel injector designers are trying to establish much lower production costs before putting them on the market. There isn't much question that if the fuel injection systems could be produced at costs comparable to that of the conventional carburetor, the switch to injectors would be virtually industry-wide.

It appears now that only the more expensive makes of cars will use injectors in the early future. Industry reports are that it will be offered with Cadillac's new Eldorado Brougham, a prestige model expected to be published

presented at the New York auto show in December.

Meanwhile several of the more widely known carburetor makers are reported to be testing radical changes in carburetors. It is rumored, for example, that a form of pressure carburetion may be offered in some 1957 model cars.

FUEL ECONOMY

Presumably this would improve fuel economy through greater combustion of the fuel fed into the combustion chambers of the engine. The auto makers, obviously, will go wholeheartedly for anything that provides more thorough combustion.

That would immediately bring a reduction in the amount of unburned fuel discharged through the exhaust system. This, in turn, would mean a lessening in what ever air pollution may be blamed on the effort to cut down on fuel upon the automobile.

The auto makers and the petroleum industry have joined forces in the effort to cut down on fuel waste. Numerous plans have been tried out by the car makers in their search for a device that would reduce the amount of unburned hydrocarbon discharged into the atmosphere. But they have not yet disclosed the form of device that eventually will be adopted.

Some of the test devices are modifications of the carburetor. Others are attachments to the exhaust pipes.

The petroleum industry, at the same time, is pushing its development of additives that improve the quality of—and the mileage potentiality—of automotive gasoline. The refiners have made no specific announcements of their program but it is rather widely believed 100 octane gasoline will be the popular premium fuel of 1959 or 1960.

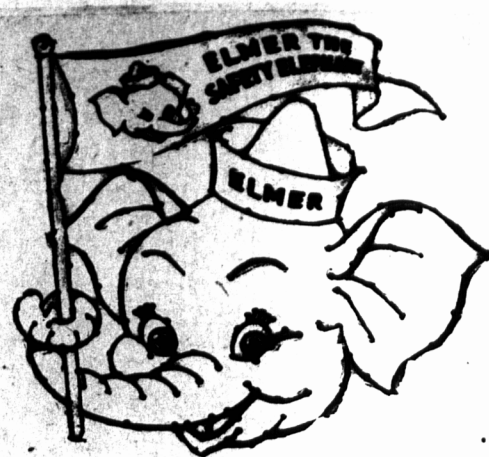
Yugoslav Dancers, Singers Begin Tour

NEW YORK (CP)—A Yugoslav state company of dancers, singers and musicians, will start a North American tour in Ottawa, Oct. 1, it was announced Sunday.

The 55-member company, whose tour is made with co-operation of the Yugoslav government, is also scheduled to perform in Toronto and Montreal before its first United States appearance in New York, Oct. 11. Its Montreal appearance will run from Oct. 2-5. The company will make one appearance in Toronto, Oct. 8.

Entirely subsidized by the ministry of education, the troupe comes from Serbia, one of Yugoslavia's six republics. It was organized in 1948 and has represented Yugoslavia in London, Paris and other European cities.

The company's program, called Slavonic Rhapsody, is an elaborate dance and music festival based on the native folk dances.

IF IT'S ONLY A HABIT

What does prayer mean? That question covers a wide range of the exercises of the soul, from the flashing Godward of a momentary desire, to the comprehensive intercession of Christ's prayer before His passion.

Two old friends met in a strange city after many years' separation. Their hotel was crowded and they had to share a double room. One of them knelt in prayer before retiring. As he rose from his knees the other asked in amazement:—"Do you still keep that up? I gave it up long ago."

The question startled his friend into examining his own mind on the matter, and he discovered that the habit had come to mean nothing to him. He had been taught as a child to "say his prayers" and he had never given up the practice, but it was no longer a factor in his thought and action.

We were all taught to "say our prayers", and we were also taught what to say. But the habit must go on to something deep and personal or go out altogether. In our home we were taught the prayers of childhood just as other children were, but early in life it was suggested to us again and again that we ought to offer our own prayers to God.

In that home the reality of God was behind all our thinking and doing, not merely as transcendental Lord of life to whom all must give account, but also as a Father, ever-present, concerned about His children's welfare and committed personally to their growth in grace. When we began really to pray the first difficulty was to know

to ask for from such a Being.

But soon it became a habit to refer everything to God—in danger or difficulty to ask His help, in moral failure to plead for pardon, in doubt to look for His leading, and always to realize that our "times were in His hands."

Then when God's love became a personal experience, prayer became a real fellowship with God.

FELLOWSHIP WITH MEN

The truth behind all this is that God is always seeking fellowship with men. His presence surrounds us as the light and stream in through every opening. When we closed our summer home in the fall, every window was heavily shuttered. Then when we entered it in Spring, the darkness was dead.

The moment a single shutter came off, the light streamed in, and when every window was opened, the whole building was flooded with light. It is so with the presence of God in the human soul. His spirit is with us in every move we make; and every incident that turns our thoughts to God, He makes an occasion for enlarging His place in our conscious being.

What did prayer mean to Jesus? We read of Him spending the night in prayer, or going into a secret place to pray, or praying in the presence of His disciples so that they requested to be taught to pray as he did, or pleading with God for each of His disciples.

His affectionate assurance to Simon Peter is a case in point: "Simon, Simon, behold, Satan demanded to have you that he might sift you as wheat, but I have prayed for you that your faith may not fail; and when you have turned again, strengthen your brethren." No wonder that Peter's recovery after his great denial was so swift and sure.

HIS FATHER'S WILL

But chiefly, prayer meant to Jesus the habit of referring to His Father everything that came before Him and acting on His Father's reply. When he was attacked for healing an impotent man on the Sabbath day He defended His action by explaining that He saw it to be His Father's will that this man should be healed, and that He carried out His Father's decision.

He added in explanation that He did nothing of His own accord, but always acted on His Father's initiative. Prayer to Jesus meant that His mind and heart were open to God continually, the Father communicating His will to His Son in everything, and the son doing what His Father wanted to have done. Then when in Gethsemane Jesus found His Father's will above His personal desires. His answer was: Not my will, but Thine be done", even when that higher will meant Calvary.

Prayer means, therefore, opening a channel of communication between God and man. Since the Divine Spirit is always seeking such openings into human life, there is a divine welcome to every such approach on our part. This is the principle behind the privilege and power given to prayers of intercession. Christ said that He came "to seek and to save that which was lost."

Every person "saved by grace" knows that this is Christ's attitude and purpose still. In His name His church can say to every sinner: God's will is your salvation. Then if God desires his salvation more deeply than we can, why does He encourage us to pray to Him for it?

Because in some way which we cannot understand, your prayer opens a way for the life giving Spirit into that person's heart. So in all world affairs, as well as in the church's mission prayer counts and counts mightily. Therefore, "pray without ceasing" that in the experience of your loved ones and in all the events that concern you, God's will be done.
