Death Of Belfast Native In N.S.

The death of a well known Nova Scotian accountant, George MacLean Sinclair, of Hopewell, Pictou Co., N.S., occurred in the Aberdeen Hospital, New Glasgow, early in January at the age of 57.

A native of Belfast, P.E.I., and son of the late Rev. A. MacLean Sinclair, he was a keen student of the Gaelic language and of Scottish history. He was an elder in the First Presbyterian Church, Hopewell, and for many years Sunday School superintendent and Clerk of Session.

He leaves his wife and three brothers, Charles, Pictou, John, of Providence, R. I., Rev. Donald Sinclair of Halifax, and one sister, Mrs. MacKenzie of Hopewell.
